CONDITIONS BAD
IN KINGSTON
PRISON

Said Convict No. E750
Before Commission
To-day.

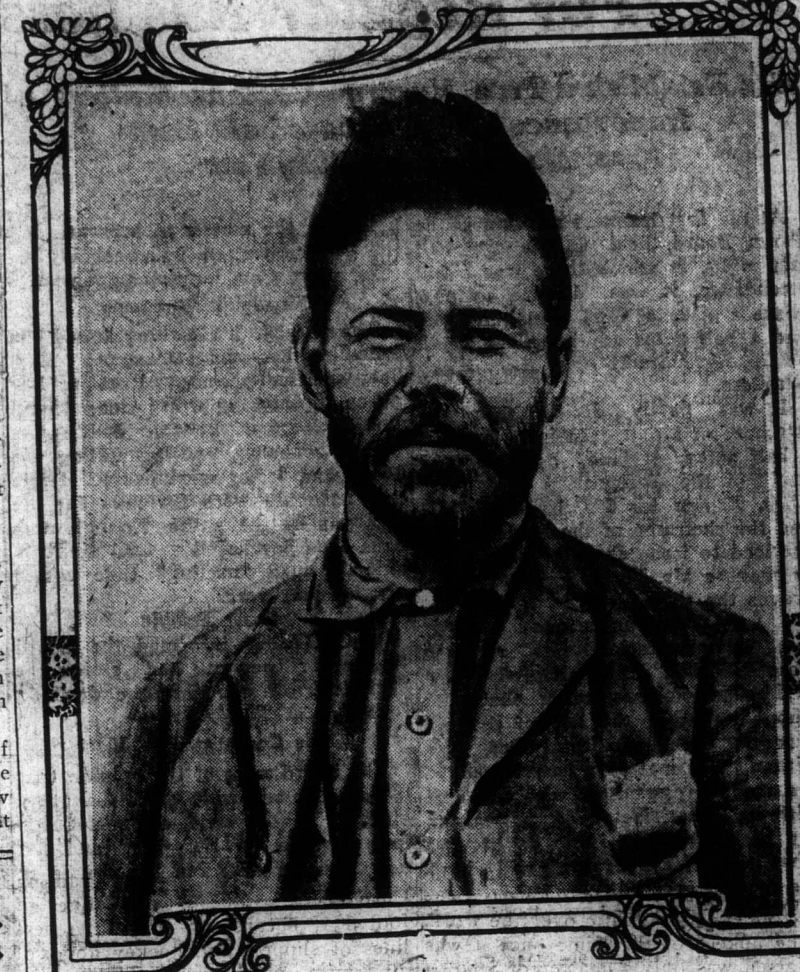

KINGSTON, Ont., Dec. 5.—At the prison reform commission session, today Samuel McCormick, a guard who did duty in the insane ward told how a colored convict had been "tubbed." The convict was strapped and was given two "dips" in the water. He knew of other convicts who had been "tubbed" in the insane ward and was "tubbed" without order from the superior officers. The convict attempted to bite an ear of one of the guards and for this he was punished. An order was received from the surgeon not to do any "tub-

bing," it was stopped for a time. The convicts he had reference to were undressed previous to being bathed. James Pegg, a witness on Thursday was recalled: "I could not say that any guard had been persecuted by the deputy warden, or that the deputy warden had showed any difference towards his guards," said the witness when questioned.

"There are no real easy posts," said the witness. "Every post has hard duty. If a man does his duty he will find lots of hard work." Ross Davis, another guard, asked about favoritism shown guards by the deputy warden said: "I don't think he was just fair in all cases." Convict E750 was called as he had information to the commission. He complained that he had been reported for merely talking Convict E 750 looking over his notes stated that his story was a long one. He declared that the two days after he was placed in the stone pile were guilty of an unnatural offence. He could not give the names of the convicts. He had secured their numbers, but these had been placed in his Bible, which had mysteriously disappeared from his cell.

the guards could have prevented it. "Are these the same cases referred to by Gordon Russell, the ex-convict, asked J. L. Whiting.

Germany Can't
Follow Lead of
Great Britain

BERLIN, Dec. 5.—It is impossible at present to provide against unemployment in the German system of national insurance against old age, sickness and infirmity, according to Clemens Delbrueck, minister of the interior. In replying to an interpellation of the Socialists in the Imperial Parliament today the minister admitted that it would be most desirable to extend the scheme to include insurance against unemployment, but that the difficulties were almost insurmountable and the financial burden also would be very great.

Leg Fractured.
While helping to lower a timber in the sluiceway situated at the west side of the Brantford dam, James Wigmore, an employee of the city, had his left leg fractured in two places just above the ankle. He was taken to the hospital, where Dr. Pearson attended him. When enquiry was made today he was resting as easily as could be expected.

SENECA FALLS, N. Y., Dec. 5.—Fire believed to have been started by an incendiary early today wiped out the village of Lodi. The loss is estimated at \$75,000. The town library and the Masonic Temple were among the structures destroyed. Three shots were fired by citizens at the supposed incendiary.

DIVERSITY OF OPINION.

Magistrates Who Could Not Agree About a Conviction.

LONDON, Dec. 5.—There was an unusual scene at the Richmond Police Court on Thursday, when counsel engaged in a licensing case entered into bargaining with a divided Bench as to the amount a defendant should be fined.

The police were prosecuting the landlord of the Hope beerhouse, Kew-road, for permitting gaming, and it was suggested, for the defendant, that the case would be met by payment of the costs without a formal conviction.

After the six members of the Bench had retired, the chairman said there could be no conviction, as they were equally divided. The only course would be to try the case again.

Mr. Barker, who represented the police, then said he would be willing for the summons to be dismissed with costs, but one of the magistrates said that he and two others thought there should be a fine.

"Say a shilling," suggested defendant's counsel, Mr. Travers. The magistrates, in a stage whisper, replied the three magistrates.

There was more bargaining, but eventually the rest of the Bench agreed to a fine of 5s, the chairman stating that they did not wish the conviction prejudicially to affect the licence in the future.

PLAINLY WORRIED
OVER SITUATION

Ald. Suddaby Says "Island Channel Must Be Widened."

At the meeting of the Board of Works last evening an informal discussion on the situation at Lorne Bridge was held by the members.

Ald. Suddaby, chairman of the board said today, that it was not the bridge work that was causing worry but the dredging of the channel through the island. "That channel through the island must be deepened and widened," said Ald. Suddaby today, "otherwise there will be a tremendous rise in the water at flood time, the results of which no one can comprehend. It is a job that will cost \$20,000, and the city is in no shape financially to do the work, otherwise I would favor having it done at once."

Ald. Suddaby when seen was decidedly pessimistic about the matter. As matters now stand the railway has until February 1 to do the work and it has been pointed out by municipal authorities that the Grand River often does its worst before that date.
