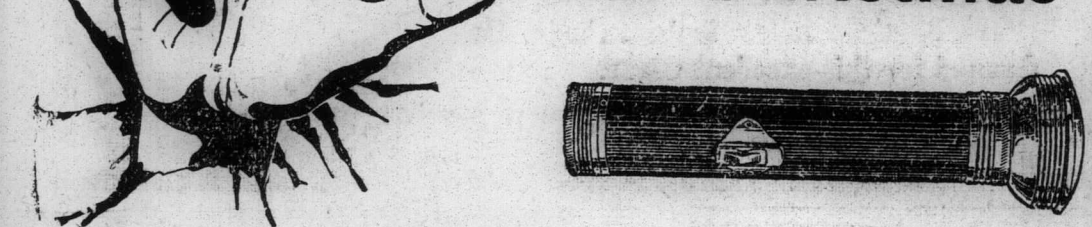

TROTSKY EDITOR IN NEW YORK

Remained in U. S. Until the Overthrow of the Emperor Nicholas

New York, Nov. 9.—Leon Trotsky, president of the Central Executive Committee of the Petrograd Council of Soldiers and Workers' delegates, was the editor for a few months this year of the *Novi Mir* (New World), a Russian revolutionary paper published in this city. He arrived in New York January 15th last from Spain, and remained here until the overthrow of the emperor, when he returned to Russia. While here he was prominent in radical circles on the East Side.

Persons who knew him in this city declare that he established a paper in Russia more than 15 years ago, and because of his revolutionary tendencies was often in jail. He was sent to Siberia in 1905 and in 1912 for participation in revolutionary plots. After his release the second time he went to Berlin, where he started a newspaper, but when the war broke out he was ordered to leave.

He lived a short time in Switzerland, then went to Paris and started a newspaper advocating peace. The Russian ambassador had his paper suppressed and he fled to Spain, where he was promptly arrested. After his release he came to the United States with his wife and two sons. The immigration authorities permitted him to land when he declared that he was not a revolutionist, but a disciple of Karl Marx and desirous of bringing concord among the nations.

LAURIER TO QUEBEC

KORNILOFF'S AID MAY BE SOUGHT

As Leader of Cossacks Strong Man of Army Might Restore Gov't.

DICTATOR IS LIKELY

Probability of Peace With Germany Discounted by Bolsheviki Policy

Washington, D.C., Nov. 9.—Disencouragement felt here over the news of the overthrow of the Kerensky government at Petrograd is tempered by the hope that the extreme Radicals who have seized the capital may not be able to extend their control over the army or any considerable part of the country. However, it is feared that much blood must be shed and the nation further demoralized before any power rises above the turmoil strong enough to control the situation.

Both the state department and the Russian embassy still were without official advice last night. Consequently there was no official comment on the situation. Informally it was pointed out that with the telegraph lines and the semi-official news agency at Petrograd in the hands of the Radicals it would be difficult to learn the true state of affairs, although there was no disposition to question the collapse of the provisional government's power in the capital.

Whether this control of the channels of information will extend to interference with dispatches which Ambassador Francis and other representatives undoubtedly are seeking to send their governments is not known.

May Look to Korniloff

The suggestion that the new power at Petrograd may be short lived is based to an extent upon the fact that the Cossacks, the base of the military forces in Russia, though extremely jealous of their own local liberties, always have been reckoned upon to support a strong conservative government. It was conceived in quarters that if Kerensky fled from the capital, should be able to bring to his support General Korniloff, the strong man of the Russian army, with his Cossack backing, he might set up a new and stronger government upon the loyalty of a majority of the large population of that ancient capital.

An obstacle to the success of such a plan is found in the possibility that Korniloff, embittered by the great wrong he had received at the hands of Kerensky, when the latter was vacillating between the Radicals and the Conservatives, might refuse to risk his future upon such a shaky and uncertain leader. Some officials think this compromising by Kerensky was largely responsible for his disaster.

May be Dictatorship.
In view of the intensity of the democratic spirit developed in Russia, since the overthrow of the Czar, it is regarded here as difficult to conceive of the appearance of any other form of government than a republic, yet in diplomatic circles, where the peculiar temperament of the masses is well understood, the opinion is expressed that out of sheer weariness with revolutions and anarchy the majority of the people might suddenly decide to confide their destinies in a dictator, thereby following in the footsteps of the Radicals in the French revolution.

Recalling that even the Bolsheviki themselves have declared for "a democratic peace" which is opposed to the German idea, it is believed to be hardly possible that on this basis Germany could entertain proposals from the Maximalists for either a peace or an armistice.

May Not Mean Peace

It is pointed out, too, that when the Germans did make a separate peace with the Maximalists, the fact that this party represents only a small section of the Russian people would make it necessary for the Central powers to continue to maintain a large military force on the border to guard against an offensive from the other element.

Therefore, it is hoped that the military situation will not change materially for the worse for the Entente powers and America as a result of these latest developments.

If any considerable portion of the Russian army can be kept in the trenches, the advent the German troops who face temporary weakness to start an offensive.

WOMEN VOTE

New York, Nov. 8.—As the result of the sweeping victory for woman suffrage in New York State at Tuesday's election, it is estimated that the State will gain at least one million new voters, 400,000 of whom will come from New York City. The women will be eligible to vote at any election after January 1, 1918, when the amendment becomes effective.

TORONTO TRIBUNALS

Toronto, Nov. 9.—Thirty exemption tribunals in this city proper and 175 in Toronto military district have today commenced business this morning; all without much formality. It was announced that in only one case at Cartier; Algoma was there any hitch. Up there one of the members at the last minute declined to act. At every tribunal opened yesterday there were numerous cases awaiting trial, and generally there were many womenfolk waiting to support the claims of their men relatives for exemption.
