· ROYALTY REBATES.

claimants for royalty rebate, the details of which were published exclusively in the Nugget of yesterday, will be far-reaching in effect, provided, of course, that the decision is sustained on appeal. Devoid of its technical aspects, the case shows at a glance that the claimants are entitled, in equity, to a rebate of the royalty collected for the season of 1898. The imposition of the royalty did not go into effect until months after grants for claims had been issued, and in the grants thus given special provision was made whereby the holders should have and enjoy all gold which they might take from their ground during the life of their grants.

In spite of this stipulation, royalty at the rate of 10 per cent. on the gross output was collected and it is upon this point that the test case outlined in yesterday's issue of this paper was brought.
