The hum of voices, and coming and going of so many persons on Montague street, during the past week, means that our law-abiding men of the deep are settling up.

At a meeting held in temperance hall on Thursday last, to decide on the lighting of the streets by electricity, a vote of the ratepayers was taken, which resulted in a large majority being against it.

On Saturday last a fruitless attempt was made by two officers to arrest a deserter from the English army, who has been lying in this county for some time. The delinquent made his escape by a back door.

A Loyal Orange Lodge was organized in the eastern end of this county a fortnight ago. We understand that a similar institution will be opened in the western end, in the near future.

The annual meeting of the Town Council was held last evening. Arrangements were made for the coming civic elections, and the meeting adjourned till Friday evening, owing to the mayor being unwell.

On Monday the young trotting stallion, Gray Cloud, owned by Dr. G. A. Polley, met with a serious mishap. The horse, which was turned loose in the Doctor's yard, and was caught in the alley-way, receiving a cut 4 in long, and 1 1/2 in deep. The animal is now doing well.

The annual session of the municipal council was opened here yesterday morning by warden West, who, in a brief but comprehensive speech, showed that the business of this session would not only be great in point of quantity but of a nature demanding the closest watchfulness of the board.

All the legislators were present save coun. Belliveau, who is laid aside with grip. Among other things taken up for consideration, appeared a petition for a road through the Glen and a counter-petition. Representative addresses the council, after which an appraiser was appointed.

For some time past a band of small boys have assembled in a shanty, built by themselves, a little below the property of Mr. John Seaboyer, for the purpose of cursing, swearing, smoking and playing cards.
