MCBRIDE IS ABSOLUTE DISSATISFIED

B. C. Premier Withdraws From Premier's

Conference

Ottawa, Oct. 15.—The interprovincial conference is over. It ended at 5 o'clock Saturday with oheers.

Premier McBride of British Columbia withdrew from the conference because the other Premiers wouldn't agree to an extra subsidy for the Pacific province. In addition to the regular grant he wanted a sliding scale, owing to the peculiar situation of the province. He wanted this to start at \$1\$ a head and decrease as the population increased.

A committee of the Dominion House met the conference and seemed favorably disposed to the claims made by the provinces, and it was gathered that their opinion would weigh, with the Government. The committee intimated that nothing would be done till the B. N. A. Act was amended, which can only be obtained by petition of the Governor-General and the two Houses of Parliament. The Government were urged to introduce the necessary resourged to introduce the necessary resolutions at the earliest possible moment.

Fisheries Question. On the fisheries question all admitted hat the present arrangement was very On the fisheries question all admitted that the present arrangement was very inconvenient by which the Dominion makes the regulations while the proprietary rights are with the provinces. The Dominion authorities thought it would be better if they took charge altogether, not because they wish to make any money, but to avoid further friction and the double jurisdiction. Some of the provinces conceded this and will recommend legislation to that effect. Mr. Whitney wished to consult his colleagues first, as the question was new to him, and it had not been suggested that it would come up, while the Ontario Minister in charge of fisheries was not present.

Quebec, Prince Edward Island and British Columbia have a tax on commercial travelers, and they were willing to abolish the tax and would recommend legislation to that effect, except in the case of agents for the sale of liquor, who should pay the same tax as the local sellers.

North Renfrew Official Returns. Ottawa, Oct. 15.—The official returns of the North Renfrew bye-election show that Gerald White won by 1,001 votes over Thomas Murray and 708 over the combined votes of Murray and Mac-Kay. The votes polled were: White 2,167, Murray 1,166, MacKay 233.

DAWSON TO NORTH POLE.

Distance Is the Same As to Nome, In

Some interesting statements regarding the proposed trip from Dawson to the North Pole, which it is intended to be made during the winter of 1906-7, were made recently by Dr. Varicle of Dawson, who was in Seattle recently for the purpose of raising funds for that undertaking.

In an interview at Seattle regarding the projected invasion of the North

In an interview at Seattle regarding the projected invasion of the North Pole territory, Dr. J. A 'aricle, among a lot of other things, said:
"It might be interesting to note that the distance to be covered in the entire trip is almost the same as from Dawson to Nome. In the winters of 1899 and 1900 hundreds made the trip down the Valon, and that is a counter that is 1900 hundreds made the trip down the Yukon, and that is a country that is as rough as any man could wish to encounter, and was then almost entirely unbroken. I believe that the trip to the North Pole can be made with as much comfort and without any more danger to life than was found in the first rush over the thirteen hundred miles of snow and ice from Dawson to Nome.

"I estimate that the total cost of the trip would be from \$130,000 to \$150,000, and this would allow ample estimates for everything that would be required. While I have not presented this to the directors of the institute, if it were possible to have a sufficient sum of money subscribed I believe it would be possible, by the establishment of several wireless stations, to keep the civilized world in touch with our movements up to the time we leave Grant Land, and again on the return of the auxiliary party from the 250 mile trip in, and announce the news of the safety of the party on the completion of the journey, or the return to the starting point at Grant Land.

"I do not apprehend any difficulty in securing the necessary money, as Seatile, San Francisco and Dawson can raise the amount if the scientists organizations fall to respond. We are just sending out the requests to the different sources from which the money will be secured. I believe the Government will make an appropriation for a part of the amount. The city of Seattle alone could afford to give \$130,000 for the advertising that will be received by having the expedition embark from this point."—Vancouver Province.

Costly Postage Stamps.

One of the highest prices yet paid—namely, £2,000—is offered by an American philatelist for a copy of the Annapolis postmaster stamp on the original envelope, similar to the one in the Earl of Crawford's collection. The stamp is said to be the only existing specimen and the greatest rarity. Other high prices are that of £1,304 paid by the German Postal Museum for the twopenny Mauritius stamp, and the £1,440 paid for the penny Mauritius stamp by the Prince of Wales, and there is a story of £3,500 having been given for the four-cent. British Guiana (The only one in the world), owned by a Parisian collector. Two thousand one hundred pounds each was offered recently for two 1848 Mauritius stamps. The "postmaster stamps" were issued before the regular United States stamps in 1845 and 1846.
