THE WOODSTOCK CASE.

The Woodstock magistrate says that when he took office-not long ago-he and the local newspapers made a bargain to the effect that the names of persons appearing before the court were not to be published unless they were sent up for trial. That was a very foolish bargain, on the part of both parties. The publicity which the newspapers can give to the misdeeds of men is a powerful influence to keep them from straying, and if the magistrate and the newspapers of Woodstock have the good of the community in view they would have made no such bargain. But the magistrate feared that the newspapers, influenced by popular clamor, would forget the bargain in the case of the cock-fighters and print the names of the culprits. Therefore he held the trials in camera and refuses to give up the names. The Woodstock magistrate and newspappers are entirely too anxious to spare the feelings of transgressors of the law. The general adoption of the Woodstock scheme would, without a doubt, have a tendency to largely increase evil doings.

THE SOO DEAL.

The Toronto Globe thus sets forth the nature of the financial deal which Premier Ross is so anxious to force upon the people of Ontario:

"By an agreement between the Ontario government and the Improve ment company the former is to guarantee a loan obtained by the latter to the amount of \$2,000,000. This guarantee it to be terminated in two years by the repayment of the principal, and in the meantime the government will control as security all the paid-up shares in the capital stock of the two railway companies, amounting to \$10,000,000 and \$214,000, respectively; all the mortgage bonds issued by the same two companies, amounting to \$6,750,000 and \$405,000 respectively; and a note of the Algoma Central company for \$725,000 secured by mortgages on the vessels in the company's fleet. The government, moreover, retains control of the land grants made to promote the construction of the railways, a considerable portion of which has been already earned but not yet conveyed."

That is either a good, safe deal for a capitalist or it is not. If it is not safe the government should have nothing to do with it. If it is a good deal for a capitalist, the capitalists will be after it like bees after honey, and the Ontario government should leave it to them, and keep out of the capitalist's business. If the security is good enough for the Ontario gov. ernment it is good enough for anybody, and all that the Improvement company need do in order to procure funds to go on with, is to bring their good safe proposition to the notice of the capitalists. If all the millions of dollars' worth of things mentioned by the Globe make the government safe in guaranteeing the loan, they would make the loan safe to the lender without the guarantee of the Ontario gov

capitalist has given the least sign of any desire to touch the business. Where the experienced financiers of the world hold aloof it is highly dangerous for that amateur capitalist, Mr Ross, to "butt" in. - Hamilto Spectator.

WHERE DOES CANADA COME IN

Under the terms in the new Grand Trunk Pacific contract the Canadian Government becomes responsible for an expenditure of \$150,000,000 and the Grand Trunk assumes obligations to the extent of \$14,500,000. The Grand Trunk, in consideration of this infinitesimal financial responsibility, secures 1,870 miles of railway from Moncton to Winnipeg for nothing for fifty years, 1,500 miles of railway from Winnipeg to the Pacific for all time, and \$25,000,000 worth of G. T. P. common stock. The country gets nothing until the expiry of the Grank Trunk's lease of the Eastern section from Moncton to Winnipeg, when it will take over the main fine and such unprofitable branches as the Grand Trunk may elect to part with. Is there any reason why Canada, having assumed responsibility for \$150,000,000 which is to be guaranteed by the Grand Trunk and construct and own the entire line for all time from Moncton to the Pacific Coast? If Canada can afford to expend \$150,000,000 on this vast project and receive nothing in return for her outlary, surely she can better herself Under the terms in the new Grand lay, surely she can better herself mater ally by increasing her expendi-
