THE PAROLE SYSTEM,

According to the list report issued by the Department of Justice, athe parole system is said to be working satisfactorily at Kingston Penitentiary. The system is but a modification of the ticket-of-leave system in vogue in England since 1849. It was initiated owing to the opposition of the penal colonies to the continued transportation of felons. Penal servitude being substituted for transportation, power was given to nardon offenders under certain conditions and to license others to be at large; such license to be revoked if necessary.

The system is said to have originated in Australia under the supertendence of Captain Maconochie. It was much assailed in 1862 on account of violent crimes being traced to "ticket-of-leavers." The law was modified in 1864 by the Penal Servitude Act, and in 1871 and 1879 by the Prevention of Crimes Act. Since then it has been considered species-

The work of parole is under the supervision of a capable officer employed by the Department of Justice and chosen for his intimate personal knowledge of criminal character, and of the working of the prison gate missions of the Salvation Army. The difficulty of finding employment by a paroled prisoner is one of the chief obstacles to reform, which, however, is greatly overcome by the efforts of the officer referred to above, one of large experience in the Salvation Army. He knows all the peculiarities of the person liberated on parole, the places each one might be expected to fill satisfactorily, and in a measure becomes surety for good behaviour. At the outset of the system in England, no such aid in getting a fresh start in life was provided. The paroled prisoner was left to fight his own way, and his difficulties and disappointments were put into a powerful drama by Tom Taylor, entitled "The Ticket-of-Leave Man," which had enormous vogue at


