Accident on the D. A. R.

There was a rather serious accident on the D. A. R. on Friday last. The accommodation going west had reached the Pigeon siding about two miles from Windsor, when the bar connecting the points gave way, causing the baggage car, passenger car and two freight cars to leave the rails. After leaving the rails the train ran on for fully an eighth of a mile, damaging the sleepers and rails. The passenger and freight cars then became detached, broke loose, left the track and turned over on their sides. The baggage car did not break away until a few rods further on. Conductor Matheson, who was in charge of the train, and driver James Leech, were slightly injured. Chas. Pitmaurice, baggage-master had his ankle injured, and Cecil Pentz, brakeman, was cut about the head, but neither of the men were seriously injured. They were attended by Dr. Black. There were only three passengers, a Mr. Trisnel, of Bradford, and two squaws. Mr. T. was considerably, though not seriously injured. He was taken to the Victoria hotel, and there attended by Dr. Black. The squaws were shaken up, and one of them, Miss Elizabeth Newell, had a skull fracture. The accident occasioned some delay to the trains: At the scene of the accident, the passengers, baggage, etc., were transferred from the Yarmouth express going east, to the Kentville express coming west, and vice versa, the former going to Kentville, reaching that place about two hours late. The track was all O. K. in the morning, when the Kentville express came along.—Hants Journal.

Reports of damage caused by the great freshet of Oct. 20th, are coming in from many parts of West Hants and King's Counties: The Messrs Shaw's lost both their bridges over the Halfway river, one to their residence and the other to their stone quarry. The black brook bridge was taken out, a man from Horton came near drowning his horse there on the Monday following. Messrs Churchill had several stacks destroyed on their dyke, the water was seven or eight feet deep where they stood. Mr. J. E. Steven's tannery property was partly submerged, fortunately his stock in rats was not damaged, he is building a breastwork on the brook bank for future protection.—Advertiser.

Representatives of the different temperance organizations of the Dominion have already called, en masse, on the government's committee, appointed to discuss the plebiscite and the future of the prohibition movement. Premier Laurier expressed himself as deeply impressed by the majority in favor of a prohibitory law, as evidenced by the plebiscite, and stated that the vote, under the unfavorable conditions that obtained, was reasonably representative. The visitors obtained the promise that the whole matter would be submitted to the full cabinet, and the decision of the majority would be carried out.
