KEEP A STIFF UPPER LIP

The Montreal "Star" of August 31, 1921, says:—"Great Britain as well as Canada must face the new American tariff with a stiff upper lip, and take such courses as they think will best protect their own trade and industry against its effects. There should be no talk of "retaliation," either of its employment or of its avoidance. "Retaliation" implies a hostile feeling—a feeling of resentment or anger. 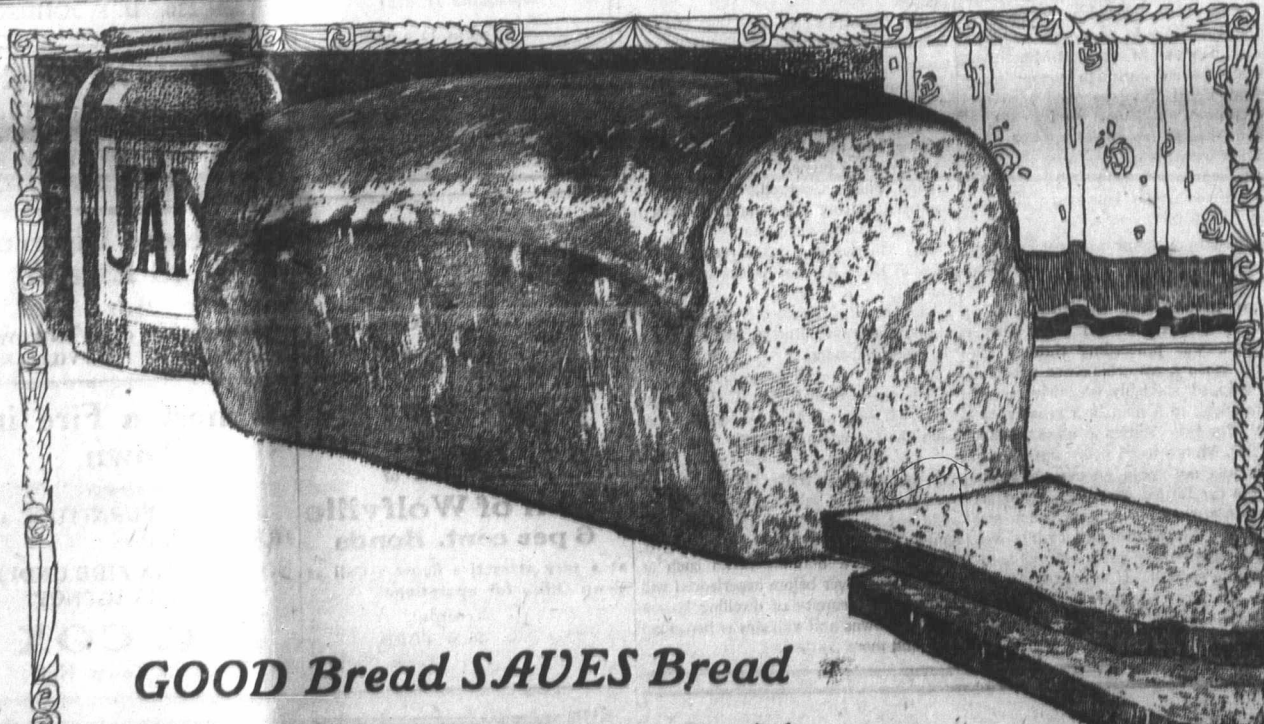
