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VERNON, B. C., July 19—Rather than submit to the exactions of steamship companies operating from Canadian At-lantic ports the Associated Growers of British Columbia, controlling 90 per cent of the tree fruit production of the prov-ince, may charter its own vessels for the export apple trade. Archie M. Pratt, general manager of the co-operative, says the organization considers the at-tempt to raise rates an absolute imposi-tion, especially when growers are strug-gling under adverse conditions to main-tain the industry. Mr. Pratt asserted that the same steamship concerns that are proposing to increase the rates on ap-ples shipped from Canadian ports are offering lower rates on United States fruit. fruit.

NEWSPRINT RECORD SET

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MEWSPRINT RECORD SET MONTREAL, Que., July 25-The Canadian Pulp & Paper Association says newsprint production in six months of 1923 has set a record. Up to the end of June, Canadian mills manufactured 619,-202 tons of newsprint paper, which pre-sented a daily average production of 3973 tons, or about 470 tons more than the daily average throughout 1922. This tre-mendous increase is due largely to the addition of new machines to the produc-tive capacity of the mills, but also re-flects an increased efficiency of operation-and the speeding up of existing machines.
