New York, April 22—Members of the American Newspaper Publishers' Association at their annual dinner here tonight listened to music and speeches from San Francisco over the telephone. In the midst of the dinner, Patrick Francis Murphy, the toastmaster, announced that a concert in the Bohemian Club, San Francisco, would render a selection of musical selections, the diners' attention to speeches by James Rolph, Jr., Mayor of San Francisco; Chas. K. Field, editor of the Sunset Magazine and others in the Pacific Coast city.

Mayor Mitchell arrived at the dinner while Mayor Rolph was delivering his speech. He was given a telephone and exchanged greetings with the western executive. The Mayor, Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University, and Henry D. Estabrook of New York, addressed the publishers.

FINAL SOCCER MATCH.
London, April 22—The referee of the final game in the English Football Cup competition will be Mr. H. H. Taylor, of Altrincham and the linesmen Messrs. J. F. Pearson, of Dudley, and G. Miller, of Norfolk. These appointments were made at the recent meeting of the Football Association Council, at which it was also decided that the replay, if such is necessary after two hours of football will be at Everton's ground a week later. The final is set for April 24 on the Manchester ground, Old Trafford.

VARDON TO PLAY GOLF

London, April 22—Harry Vardon and Edward Ray, two of Britain's Premier professional golf players will sail for the United States on May 15. They will compete in the American open championships.

PARISIANS KILLED

Paris, April 22—Tout Paris, a Socialist register of the French capital, just issued, contains the names of 1,500 Parisians killed on the battlefield up to Feb. 25, 1915. Included in this number are the names of 20 generals, 367 other officers, 14 priests and 139 titled members of the aristocracy.

CLUB MANAGEMENT ISSUES STATEMENT

The Board of Management of the Nanaimo Literary and Athletic Club at their regular meeting held last night decided that the lease of the Club premises to Mr. Russel Leighton of Vancouver be confirmed and that the members of the Club and the General Public be notified of the fact that the lease had been made and that the Press be asked to publish the facts in connection therewith.

Mr. Leighton has leased the Club premises, furniture and effects for the term of one year, to maintain the place as a purely Athletic Club; to provide clean, healthy sport and to conduct the business in accordance with the terms of the charter. The Club retains possession of the Library and the Grounds so that parties wishing to use the field must make arrangements with the Secretary, Mr. Naylor. Mr. Leighton has entire control of the balance of the Club premises and apparatus and is prepared to make satisfactory terms for the use of same. The members of the Nanaimo Literary and Athletic Club still retain their membership but must arrange with Mr. Leighton for the use of the premises and we trust they will use every effort to enable Mr. Leighton to make a success of his venture.

One lonely soldier in the trenches, said Mr. Hobhouse, Postmaster-General, speaking at Bristol, advertised for correspondents in a newspaper, and three days later 3,000 letters, 6 bags of small parcels, and 90 large parcels were delivered to him. CAPTURE NORWEGIAN STEAMER.

London, April 22—The Germans have captured and taken into Hamburg the Norwegian steamer Brilliant which left Frederikstad, Norway, April 13 for London, says the Morning Post's Christiania correspondent. The steamer was loaded with a cargo of granite, deal planks and paper.

GARDEN CONNECTED WITH HIGH SCHOOL

In pursuance of the policy adopted by the school board of encouraging the children to cultivate flowers and trees, both develop a taste for gardening and add to the beauty of the school premises, a large garden has been cleared, plowed and harrowed, and fenced in an excellent manner, the fence being 4 1/2 feet high and built for excluding small predators both bipeds and quadrupeds. The grounds exceed 8,000 sq. feet in area and thus entitles the Board to receive the government grant to assist the movement.

When Mr. Gibson, director of Agricultural Education, was in Nanaimo last Autumn he stated that this was one of the few places where he had seen school gardens, though he had seen numbers of gardens at schools, the difference is essential.

In a few days the boys and girls of the High School will begin the work of preparing the ground and seeding. A large portion of the ground will be devoted to a Wild Garden designed to show the indigenous flora of the Nanaimo district and will be the perpetual charge of the advance junior class who study botany. This section will be improved and added to every year by successive classes.

Individual pupils will assume charge of garden plots singly or in groups as suits their own wishes.

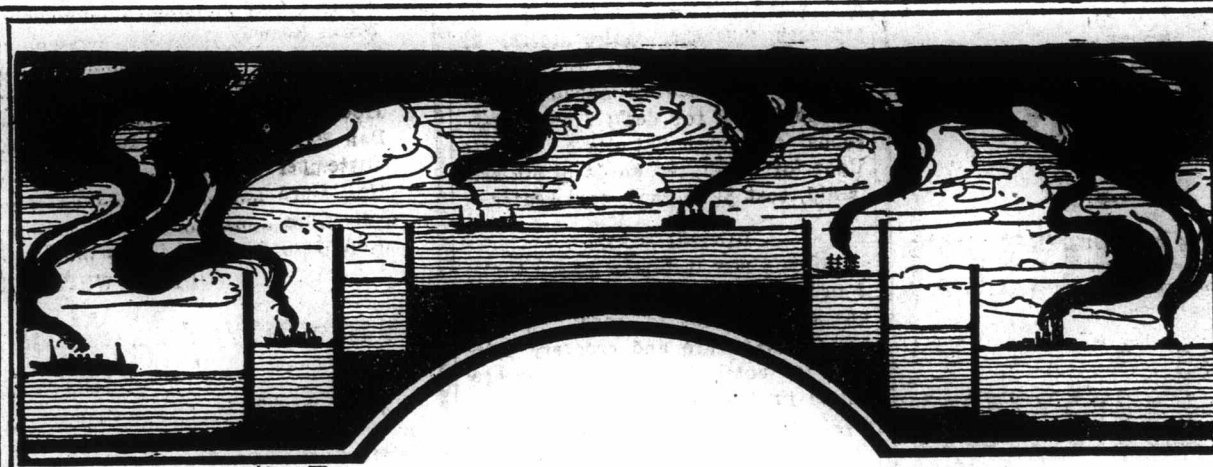
In time it will be a nice garden, but too much must not be expected this year as they have a late start and have a great deal of school work to do.

EIGHT BODIES RECOVERED

Birmingham, Ala., April 20—Eight bodies have been taken tonight from the ruins of the two retail stores wrecked yesterday when a wind storm demolished a brick wall left standing by a recent fire. Rescuers continued to search for the three persons missing since the collapse. Most of the twenty persons injured were reported doing well tonight.
