MURPHY STABLE LOOKS GOOD FOR 1921 CAMPAIGN

Xen Scott, One of Turf's Best Known Writers, Sizes Up Poughkeepsie Outfit

BILL SHAREN REGARDED AS ONE OF THE BEST

Fredericton Bred Trotter Believed to Be One of World's Greatest Trotters

[Xen Scott in Cleveland Plain Dealer.] Despite severe accidents and an attack of appendicitis, Tommy Murphy finished the 1920 season the biggest money and race winning driver of the Grand Circuit. And Murphy, none the worse for his setbacks, will be back on the big line next summer with another star stable, but one that numerically will not be as large as his 1920 combination.

Little is heard from Poughkeepsie, the Murphy headquarters, during the winter. It is not until the racing season actually begins that the race fans are able to learn the make-up of the Murphy stable.

Several days ago Murphy was a Cleveland visitor. As usual he did not care to talk much about his racing prospects, but enough was learned to tabulate the horses that will be raced by Murphy providing, of course, they stand up satisfactorily under the rigors of training.

At present there are eight trotters and eight pacers with race records in the Murphy outfit. That number is augmented considerably by two and three-year-olds and green ones that have yet to make their niche. Taking up the trotters, Peter Manning, 2:02½, champion trotter of 1920, apparently is in great form and has taken on considerable flesh. He is being jogged every day and by many critics is considered to be a two-minute trotter whenever Murphy deems fit to shoot him for such a mark.

Arlon Guy, that last season won five out of six races as a three-year-old and tramped to a mark of 2:04½, is another that has wintered well. Arlon Guy has matured considerably and is now a grand leecher. He is the son of the late Rex and will be Murphy's main reliance in the 2:05 trot remains to be seen. Murphy has a lot of confidence in Charley Rex and if that veteran trains up to expectation and displays an inclination to stay on the trot it need occasion no surprise if Arlon Guy is carried over when the season of 1921, in the same manner as was Arlon Guy in 1920.

That procedure would give Arlon Guy two seconds Rex allowance in 1921 and make him eligible to 2:07 trot instead of the 2:05 class. Arlon Guy finished the 1919 season with a mark of 2:03½. She was not raced last year though carried along with the rest of the Murphy stable. She was given regular work and will blossom forth again this summer as a

By many Arlon Guy is reckoned a two-minute prospect, and though she will have to meet a bunch of stars in the class to which she is now eligible, it is almost a cinch that she will be the favorite when she makes her first start. As a racing machine, Arlon Guy is almost perfect. When it comes to speed, it is still a question as to how fast she can go. She is now apparently at her prime and will be certain to be one of Murphy's topliners.

The "Great Trotters." Bill Sharen, 2:03½, and Peter Daw, 2:12½, will be the Murphy entries in stake events slower than 2:07. Gall Curci jumped into fame last fall when she trotted an exhibition mile to her present record, a record that is not a bar of eligibility. Gall Curci can start in any event. Bill Sharen has been a star of the half-mile tracks. In two seasons of campaigning he has not met defeat. However, there are several other three-year-olds that have shown plenty of strength to any noticeable degree. Peter Daw is a three-year-old futurity candidate. Rose Scott, trained by Lord Priceo (2), 2:16½, a miniature of La Princesse; Hope Priceo, for which as a two-year-old a reported price of \$15,000 was had; Jane Yelard, 2:11½; and Lee the Great (2), 2:20, appear to be future greats.

For the two-year-old trots, Murphy has several candidates but not as many as in former years. The Pacing Division. Getting over to the pacing division we find Woodpatch, 2:05½; Esther R., 2:03½; Juno, 2:02½; Goldie Todd, 2:02½; Roy Grattan, 2:01½; Sanardo, 2:02½; Foxey Ann, 2:07½; Lady Grattan, 2:09½, and the 4-year-old filly, Patima, make a formidable array. Woodpatch and Esther R. are doubtful quantities and it is very doubtful if Esther will be included in the Murphy racing outfit of 1921. Sanardo and Juno appear capable of holding their own in most any company. Goldie Todd is now eligible to the 2:05 paces, while Roy Grattan will be the stable's stake candidate in the 2:06 paces. Foxey Ann is again eligible to the slow stakes and will undoubtedly be named in the ones to which she is eligible as will the mare Lady Grattan.

The Murphy stable, as it now stands, is one of the most powerful in the country and is well balanced. It probably will be augmented by the addition of two or three before the opening of the big line, although Murphy has stated his campaigning string of 1921 will be considerably smaller than he has carried in several years. But the class of the horses already in the combine is such as again to make the Murphy stable stand out as a wonderful racing outfit, and when Murphy's wonderful driving ability is taken into consideration, it looks as if the stable of the Poughkeepsie wizard again will be the leading money and race winning outfit of the Grand Circuit, as it has been in ten of the past eleven years.

CANADIENS EASTERN TRIP CALLED OFF

George Kennedy Says Playeys are in Bad Shape and Team is Disbanded

ARRANGEMENTS MADE FOR N. H. L. PLAY OFF

Stanley Cup Games to Start on Coast on March 21st, With Uniform Rules

[Canadian Press by Leased Wire.] Montreal, March 9.—At a special meeting yesterday of the National Hockey League here dates for the play-off for the championship of the league between Ottawa and Toronto were fixed as follows:

At Ottawa March 10, at Toronto March 12, if third game is necessary at Hamilton March 15. Winners of the National Hockey League championship will play in the Stanley Cup Series for the championship of the world against either Vancouver or Seattle, starting March 21.

Two Disputes Settled. It was expected that Canadiens would protest Saturday's game against Ottawa on the ground that Ottawa had used Harry Broadbent and that Toronto had kept Cully Wilson out of the last four games, but President George Kennedy announced that his protest would not be pressed.

Toronto and Canadian clubs disputed over the Wilson case, Toronto claiming that his transfer to Canadiens was certainly subject to recall. It was decided that Toronto should pay his salary for the games out of which they kept him. On the case of Sprague Cleghorn also came up and in view of his desire to finish out the season with St. Patrick's, the Ottawa club withdrew its claim.

It was decided to apply the \$500 fine recently collected from the Ottawa club to the Joe Hall Memorial fund. The winner of the Ottawa-Toronto series will go to the coast and will play for the Stanley Cup and the world's championship in three games out of five. Uniform rules will be arranged with the probable agreement that the teams play six men with the forward pass area increased to 20 feet on each side of centre and the Pacific coast penalty system in effect.
