A big break has occurred in the lark market in New York. Prices have dropped from \$1.50 to \$1. There are reports to be ten million larks there unsold, so that this drop will be a serious matter. The greater portion of this stock emanates from St. Louis. The effect in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia will be that larks will go down considerably in price. As the bulls about beginning operations it will have a bad effect.

Pursuant to the Inspector's notice the Liquor License Commissioners for the County held their annual meeting on the 25th ultimo, to take into consideration the granting of licenses for the year commencing the first day of May then following, to the applicants who petitioned for the same, as mentioned in the Inspector's notice in the Royal Gazette. All the members were present, and the meeting was opened by Thomas Craig, the Chairman of the Board. In reference to the enforcement of the law, the Inspector stated in his report that there were four violations during the year for selling without license, namely, Finton Hines who was convicted and fined \$50, and costs for selling liquor at Ed River Crossing, and Annis Sargent who was also convicted and fined alike sum and costs for selling liquor at the same place. Also Peter Frank Flottotte who

was convicted and fined a like sum and costs for selling liquor in Sunny-side settlement; also Levi Loubert who was convicted and fined a like sum and costs for selling liquor in the Tobique Settlement. Finton Hines and Levi Loubert not having the money to pay their fines had to go to Dalhousie jail for three months. Having served their time they are again at large. But they will not run any more risks in regard to selling liquor without license. They do not like so much close confinement.

Mrs. Sargent and Mr. Flottotte paid up, but they did not look pleasant. Licenses are granted to the five applicants who petitioned for a renewal of their respective licenses as heretofore.—Cor

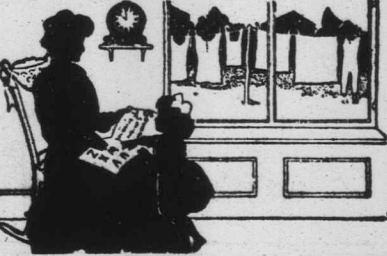
