THE WEATHER. The New British Bayonet. The selection of the Japanese type of bayonet for the British army, recently announced, was decided upon after tests with the German, American, Japanese and British patterns. The new bayonet, placed on the short rifle, will restore the five inches lost in total length of reach by the introduction of the short barreled arm. The latter with the present bayonet is 4 feet 8 1/2 inches in length, and with the new type it is 5 feet 1 1/2 inches. The approved pattern is very light and tough. It has a blade a fraction over 17 inches in length and seven-eighths of an inch wide in its broadest part. The blade is quite straight, and has a thickened back two-thirds of its length, the edge being carried down the back for the remaining one-third, one side only to form a means of catching an opponent's weapon when engaged, and either snapping it off or wrenching it from his grasp. On the other side is a steel slot or groove, set with double clip springs, operated by the pressure of the thumb on a stud, for fixing on to the rifle. There is no ring to go over the muzzle of the rifle, and so offset the firing, and when it is in its brown leather scabbard has the appearance of a short cane rather than a bayonet.—London Standard.
