Newcastle, Jan. 10— A very large-ly attended meeting in the town hall was addressed last night by Capt. Sizele, Salvation Army Chaplain ov-erseas three and a half years, who left Fraces for Canada the day after the signing of the armistice. Capt. Steele spoke very interestingly of the great work done by the army im-mediately behind the firing line, at the base camps, hospitals. etc. The drive for \$1,000,000 for the S.
