First White Man Born In Province

Father-In- Law Of Newcastle Boy

Huntingdon.-Mr. Thomas Fra ser York has the proud distinction of being the head of the mainland of British Columbia, as he was the first white man to be born colony of British Columbia Federation, when Vancouver island became part of the new province. At the age of 62 he is still a young man, strong and erect, and possessing a set of pearly white teeth which need no dentist, Mr. York has never known a day's illness, and proof of his great staying powers is afforded in the fact that he made no less than eight round trips between Vancouver and Halfiax

with the Railway Service guards.

Born on October 21, 1858, in For Yale, the son of Thomas and Maria York, he lived in adventurous times putting in the first four years of his life mostly at Spuzzum, across the river just below where the present suspension bridge now stands. In the terribly severe win ter of 1862, the miners were starved out of Spuzzum, and Mrs. York trekked back to Fort Yale, while little Tom was carried in a rocking chair on the back of an Indian. whose name was Old Yolk" after little Tom's father. The Yale road was not built at that time, and there was only a trail, which affords a glimpse of what the grand pioneer women of British Columbia were epared to do in the early days.

Spent Life At Huntingdon

In 1865, the Yorks moved down Sumas to what is now known as the York farm, a few miles from Huntingdon near the international boundry. With the exception of the time when he was at school or serving his country Mr. York has been a resident of Huntingdon ever since and can be reckoned the father of Huntingdon. The only white people in the district in those days were Mr. Volket Veder, Mr. David Miller and Mr. James Chadsey, all known names in the Fraser valley There were big settlements of In-dians at Kilgard and on the Sumas deservation which has since reservation which has since washed away, the migrating to Dewdney. were no roads, and dairy produce was shipped Miller's Landing, at wh'ch point the great Sumas reclamation dyke will be built in the near future. Everything had to be carried by canoe and Victoria was the best marke for Huntingdon produce.


Mr. York had a great admiration for his parents. His father, a York shire ocal miner, came out under the Hudson's Bay company and landed in Nanaimo in 1854, Mr. York's mother and sister accompanying him. An officer on the boat was Robert Dunsmuir, afterwards to be come famous in the history of Bri-British Columbia

As a miner, Mr. Tom York, Sr. assisted in opening up the coamines at Old Whatcom, now known as Bellingham.

From Old Whatcom his mother and sister canoed straight through to Yale, being the first white wo-men on the river. Mrs. Phoebe Campbell, Mr. York's sister, atill resties on her farm in the district. Pres^{en}ted with Farm In recognition of being the first white man born in the colony of British Columbia, Mr. Fraser York

was presented with 160 acres of land on the Sumas prairie by Premier Walldemi Mr. Yo.k farmed until 1893, when he was appointed customs officer at Huntingdon, occasionally filling also the post of immigration officer. He was in the service for 22 years when he resigned. He en-listed in 1916 for overseas, but on account of his age he was put in the railway guaris, although he was quite prepared to go over to France. One would imagine that educa tion would be overkoked in those early days, but there was a private school in Yale, conducted by Mon-sieur Travoir, an enterprising Frenchman, and young Tom attended that school, later going to St. Louis college in New Westminister, destroyed in the fire some years after wards. There was no free educa-tion in those days, and children made the best of their opportunities In 1878, Mr. Fraser York married Miss Josephine MacDonald, a daugh ten of Mr. and Mrs. MacDonald of Fort Douglas, at Chilliwack, They have one sen, Mr. Thomas Fiancis York, and three daughters, Mrs. H. N. Frith (Mabel), of Vancouver; Mrs. Perley Fleming (Maude), of Victoria, and Mrs. George Newton (Lenods), also of Victoria. It is hardly necessary to explain how Mr. York came to bear the name "Fraser." when one remembers that his mother was the first white woman to travel on the waters of the Fraser through the upper country. He is named after Stephen Fraser. Miss Josephine MacDonald, a daugh

Fraser. In politics, Mr. York used to be s In politics, Mr. York used to be a Onservative, he says, but now he has leanings towards a Farmer party. His pastime is hunting and fishing and many a visitor has had a good day's sport with Fraser York, who can being down his duck or land a big steelhead with anyone.
