## WILLARD IN STIFF WORK

Wrestler Mauled the Champion and Is Cursed From the Ring

TOLEDO, O., June 12.—Six spirited rounds of boxing and five miles of road work constituted the training programme for Jess Willard today in preparation for the heavyweight contest with Jack Dempsey here on July 4th.

The champion stepped three rounds each with Jack Hempel and Walter Monahan and boxing experts regarded his glove work as the most impressive since he started training here ten days ago. He used a rangy left with telling effect on Monahan and set such a furious pace for Hempel that the latter was in a dizzy condition after the final round.

Wrestler Musses Willard Up  
Willard wound up the day's exercise by wrestling with Soldier Stanton and the champion left the ring with a bleeding back as a result of Stanton's rough work in pulling and tugging Willard around the ring. The champion's flesh is somewhat soft and when his attention was called to the condition of his back he promptly chased Stanton out of the ring.

The unsmiling Dempsey, still chafing under the restraint placed on him went through a lively workout but was not permitted to pull on the gloves. He covered about seven miles on the road, tugged at the weights punched the bag and shadow boxed. Although the wound over his eye is healing rapidly, Manager Jack Kearns decided not to take any risks of having the cut reopen. So it is probable that the challenger will not do any boxing until on Friday or possibly Saturday.

## PREVENT POTATO ROT

Spraying With Bordeaux Mixture Proven Very Effective.

Machinery Must Be Kept Well Oiled. If It Is to Work Efficiently—An Expert Discusses the Question From Every Angle.

**L**ATE BLIGHT and Rot of Potatoes can be prevented by spraying with Bordeaux mixture. Commence spraying when the plants are from five to eight inches high and keep the foliage covered with Bordeaux throughout the season. Take special care to see that the spraying is very thoroughly done if the weather is at all damp about the 15th of July, as blight often begins about this time. Add a poison which is necessary for potato beetles—arsenate of lead paste 3 1/2 lbs. to each 40 gals. of the liquid spray, or Paris green 2 lbs. to 40 gals. or a mixture of 2 lbs. arsenate of lead paste and 1 lb. of Paris green to 40 gals. From three to seven applications should be made, depending upon the season—the wetter the weather the larger the number. Do not put off spraying because it looks like rain. If the spray is on the plants when it rains the rain comes it will be dry and sun-dried by the time the rain has passed, which takes place during or soon after rain. Such spraying should prevent not only Late Blight and Rot but also Early Blight and potato beetles.

Thorough spraying only is effective. If thorough spraying is to be done sufficient Bordeaux mixture must be used. From 50 to 150 gals. per acre should be applied at each spraying, and when the plants are large not less than 100 gallons per acre should be used. Thorough spraying means covering of every portion of the potato plant with Bordeaux mixture in the form of a fine mist. This can only be done when the solution is applied with good pressure, so as to insure covering every portion of the plant. The best results from spraying are obtained when potato sprayers are used which are fitted with a T-joint attachment so as to insure covering both surfaces of the leaves at each spraying. When the plants are large it has been found that it pays to go over each row twice at each spraying. J. E. Howitt, O. A. College, Guelph.

## The Importance of Keeping Machinery Properly Oiled.

The importance of keeping machinery properly oiled may be better realized when we try to compute in dollars and cents, the annual sacrifice in machine efficiency through friction. Carelessness in lubrication may easily reduce the efficiency of a machine fully 10 per cent. At the same time the machine itself is wearing out faster, on account of the needless friction, than owing to the real work done.

The lubricant consists of minute balls or globules. These revolve in the contact between the faces in mutual contact forming a cushion, keeping the metals apart. Its use is not only to reduce friction, but also to carry away heat, to prevent wear, to prevent rust, to prevent the heat generated. All liquids have not sufficient sustaining powers to be used as efficient lubricants. Some cannot be retained between the metals; others are too thick together. To resist the tendency of the metal to tear the lubricating film apart, these globules must have a good deal of internal strength and must stick together well. They must also cling well to the metal, or they will be squeezed out of the bearing.

The oils and the fats are the principal lubricants. The mineral oils are the most common. They are light and heavy. Castor oil, neatfoot, tallow and rape are thick. Nothing is better for high speed bearings and light spindles or shafts than sperm oil. It is superior to this, but it is also expensive.

But there is relatively little pure lubricant in the market. For it is usually more economical to employ a compound oil, compounded for special uses, than to use pure lubricants which, after all, are often heavily adulterated—gun, soap lime, alumina soda, and free acids have their own distinct purpose to serve in the composition of cheap oils. The chief advantage, however, pertaining to the use of compound oils is that the objectionable qualities, of one kind of lubricant can be neutralized by mixing it with a lubricant of another kind. For instance, vegetable and fish oils are drying oils, and that is, they oxidize rapidly, and cause gumming or clogging of the bearings to which they are applied, unless they are kept very dry. But after these oils are exhausted they are taken away and put in more. If a constant supply is required made a new bed every two or three weeks during the winter. Be sure to keep all the front dimmed. Put burlaps of brown paper over the windows to give the bright pink color so much desired. H. MacLennan, B.S.A., Ontario, Vegetable Specialist.

## MACHINES SAVE LABOR

Work of Efficient Gas Engine in House and Barn.

How Early Winter Pruning May Be Done Without Injury—Winter Rhubarb is Delicious and May Be Grown by All.

**S**AVING labor in stable and home, by the use of machinery, is one of the great economic problems facing the attention of farmers to-day. Through the use of machinery they can produce even more, at less cost, than in years past, when labor was plentiful, and tolerably cheap.

Probably never before in the history of the farming world have so many farm problems been solved by a single piece of machinery as has now been accomplished by the gasoline engine. In the stable it can be employed to advantage in grinding feed for the stock. It can cut feed and ensilage. It can pump water for the house and stable whenever one pleases; a hydrant on the lawn, and in the stock yards to which a hose may be attached for washing the buggy, sprinkling the lawn, flushing pens and stable and for other purposes, is a source of much satisfaction, pleasure and comfort.

By means of a line shaft a gas engine may operate many labor-saving machines at the same time. It can run the grindstone, root pulper, tanning mill, cream separator, churn, sheep shearer, horse clippers, rotary comb and the milking machine, with which it is possible to milk two cows in about six minutes, including the time required for changing and setting. Further assistance may be had by attaching the power for refrigeration and for circulating milk over a cooling surface—a practical necessity.

No longer need the preparation of window and its application with a brush be assigned to warmer regions, for the engine can pump the mixture from a tank or barrel through a hose attached to a spraying outfit. It is possible to pump it two hundred feet. When the job is done the hose should be cleaned out by having fresh water pumped through it.

## Light Fall Pruning Is Safe.

Light pruning in fall is permissible, but heavy pruning is dangerous and likely to result in serious damage from winter killing, especially if the succeeding winter is severe. The injury is caused by drying out of the cut area, and may be prevented by covering all wounds of any size with a good covering of paint made from pure lead and oil. Do not use prepared paints as these contain injurious benzine or turpentine driers. To make an effective covering it will be necessary to give not less than two coats, because one coat will not prevent checking and drying of green wood. Good tar makes an excellent covering, and is easily applied.

This matter of covering wounds made in fall or early winter is frequently slighted by orchard men, but the writer has seen serious damage to trees from neglect of this precaution that he feels justified in warning fruit growers with regard to the practice. In experimental trials in the college apple orchard, vines that so hard as Duxbury, Oldenburg, Wolf River, Snow and Scott's Winter have suffered very serious injury following November pruning with the cuts left unprotected. The wounds dry out around the edges and by spring the dead area is greatly enlarged, frequently extending down the trunk or branch for a foot or more. The dead bark comes away later, leaving a large dead area, detrimental to the parts above and certain also to decay later.—Prof. J. W. Crow, O. A. College, Guelph.

## How Winter Rhubarb Is Produced.

The production of rhubarb in winter has become of considerable value among gardeners. It is easy to do if certain methods are followed. It is one making a permanent business of rhubarb forcing, it is necessary, each year to set out a new bed, as plants once forced are of no further use. In the spring large roots should be dug, split in one end and sections and replaced in rich moist ground. During the growing season they are kept cultivated and free from weeds. In the fall they are covered with manure. Next spring a second bed is planted as before. That fall a large part of the first bed is taken up, leaving sufficient to replace another bed the next spring. The roots are taken up the last thing in the fall before the hard freezing weather comes and are placed in piles in a shed where they can easily be got out when needed. Be sure to keep all the front dimmed. Put burlaps of brown paper over the windows to give the bright pink color so much desired. H. MacLennan, B.S.A., Ontario, Vegetable Specialist.
