All the Law Lords of this highest court of appeal, before whom the case was argued, decided the act was intra vires, or within the powers of the Provincial Legislature. This decision of the Privy Council will be further reaching in its effects than the Manitoba act; for it establishes the principle that Provincial Legislatures have the power to pass prohibitory laws.
