Two girls, 3 and 4 years old, were drowned at South River yesterday. They wandered out on the ice.

Police Arrested the Players.

Brantford, Feb. 28.—The Berlin-Brantford professional league fixture ended up at three quarter time by the Berlin management withdrawing their team from the ice after the Brantford police had arrested one player from each team for indulging in a slugging match, which finally precipitated a free-for-all fight between the players of both teams.

The score stood 8 to 8 in favor of Brantford when Manager Williams decided that his aggregation had enough. Dusty had scored Brantford's eighth goal by batting the puck in off Lehman's stick and came back a moment later to repeat. Lehman chopped him and Dusty retaliated, the two clinching and going down. In a moment every player on the ice engaged in the fight until the police rushed in. There was little hockey in the game, Berlin players seldom going past centre ice and contenting themselves with long lifts towards the Brantford defence. It was a sheer case of "lay down" and the crowded house commenced derisive cat calls and hooting, finally tossing a few lemons out towards some of the worst of the Berlin offenders at loading.

Gross, who injured Sanford at Berlin, did not appear, and Frood merely stood near Lehman during the play. When Berlin supporters arrived at the station there were renewed disturbances, bottles and other weapons being hurled at the visitors.

There are now very few amongst us who can recollect the lithe, active, form of Dr. Renouf for many years the Coroner of the city, and fever still, who remember his superhuman efforts in the cholera ridden district of Tarahan's Town during that awful visitation. Yet it seems remiss that his name and his fame should have no place at the side of his brother practitioners.

I think, Mr. Editor, that the Cowan Ward is superfluous, as the noble work of Agnes Cowan will be ever kept green by the devoted ladies of the "Cowan Mission" and that the memory of Dr. Renouf's long medical career in his native city, extending over nearly half a century, should be perpetuated by having one of the Wards of the General Hospital named after him.

On Telegraphic Communication, Steam Transit and Roads and Ferries in the District of Saint Barbe.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—In the Governor's Speech from the Throne at the opening of the House telegraph extension in the District of St. Barbe was foreshadowed. Telegraph extension was begun during Sir R. Bond's regime, and offices were established at LaSalle, Western Cove and Seal Cove, which proved to be of immense benefit to these places. The late Premier had promised me that development would go on in that direction, should he come back to power; and the leader of the present Government would only be carrying out a work that had been initiated by his predecessor in office. I would suggest wireless stations on the north-east coast in the neighbourhood of Quirpon, or St. Anthony Head. The land wires will have to go to Quirpon as this is a port for vessels from Green Bay, Bonavista Bay, Trinity Bay and other places when on their way to the Labrador. Besides some 100 families fish out of Quirpon, and a telegraph station would consequently be of immense importance to the fishermen there.

I might add that a wireless station at Quirpon would bring the owners of craft-harbouring at Quirpon from the different places above mentioned into communication with wireless stations at the Labrador before proceeding on their voyage there. Telegraph stations at other points along the north-east coast would greatly conduce to the advantage of the people, as they would be brought into direct touch with St. John's where they could telegraph for provisions, fishing gear, etc.; again, what is most important, a storm might sweep the coast, which has happened more than once before. There is also a demand for roads, bridges and ferries. The same thing applies to the north-west part of the District, and I trust that this work will be begun at as early a date as possible and without any unnecessary delay. I have presented numerous petitions in the House asking for telegraph extension, roads, bridges and ferries which are an absolute necessity if the District is ever to come to the front. St. Barbe is deserving of more than an ordinary share of attention at the hands of the Legislature, for the District hasn't received the benefits in the past which other Districts now enjoy. A small steamer to ply in parts of White Bay and running to Griquet where she would connect with the Coastal boat, proceeding from there to Cape Norman, through the Straits to Flower's Cove at which place she would meet with the Home, and thence back again to Griquet. When a few days ago I presented petitions from Greenspond, in White Bay, and Cook's Harbour, Cape Norman, upon this subject, the hon. member for Bonavista, Capt Winsor, in supporting the petitions expressed himself as being in perfect accord with my suggestions. Steamers have been subsidised in Bonavista Bay, Fogo and Fortune Bay, and why shouldn't St. Barbe receive the same privilege? The people are demanding it; and I trust that the Government will take the matter up at once, and extend to St. Barbe the great blessings of steam and telegraphic communication.
