Putting Off the Evil Day.

"Two years from now we shall have to render an account of this stewardship and stand or fall by our record."

In these words, Sir Edward Morris intimated to the electors of Burin that it was his intention to put off the day of reckoning as long as possible. He told them that it was his present intention not to hold a general election before the fall of 1913. That is the plain meaning of what he said for the words were uttered on the 11th of the present month, and an interval of two years elapsing from that time will bring us to the autumn of 1913. Although this is the declared intention of the Premier, it does not follow that the Premier will be able to effect his purpose. The Premier, naturally enough, in view of the growth, certain and sure, of unpopularity which is rising more and more every day is desirous of holding the government as long as he can, and it is then not surprising that he has expressed an intention of putting off the date of the General Elections to the latest date he possibly can. But he will have much to contend with before he can effect his purpose. He will be up against the Statutory regulation of the length of term of any House of Assembly. He will be up against the Governor's desire to have a House of Assembly in existence which he can call together if circumstances should call for a session of the Legislature, and in this matter the will of the Governor will be paramount and that of the Premier. To make this matter clearer, we draw the attention of our readers to Section 1 of Chapter II. of the Newfoundland Consolidated Statutes, 1892. This section runs thus: "The House of Assembly shall continue, notwithstanding the demise of Her Majesty, for four years from the day on which they shall by proclamation be appointed to meet."

From this, it is clear that the House of Assembly cannot continue after the latter part of May 1913. After that date there will be no House of Assembly to call together. The Governor will have no House of Assembly to call together, no matter what may happen, or what circumstances may arise, which would necessitate the meeting of the Legislature.

Highway Robbery

At Bell Island.

Man Assaulted Last Night—His Money Stolen—Unconscious on Track Until This Morning.

At 7 o'clock this morning as Messrs. Hy. Goldstone and N. Cohen, business men of Bell Island were walking out from the mines to the pier to take passage for St. John's, they were surprised to meet a respectably dressed young man who was in a terrible condition, was looking for the police and told a sensational story of outrage and robbery. He said he only arrived at the island yesterday afternoon from the United States to go to work with the D. I. S. Coy. about the machinery and being a stranger, at 7 p.m. yesterday while walking along the company's tracks, met 3 men whom he asked to direct him to a boarding house. The question was hardly put to them before one of the trio felled him with a blow and then all three falling on him they beat and kicked him into insensibility. Just before he met Messrs. Goldstone and Cohen he had recovered consciousness. He had been unconscious on the tracks all night and was in a terrible state. His face and head was covered with blood and he was a mass of deep and dangerous wounds and to add to his misery, his assailants had relieved him of his gold watch and chain and all the money he possessed, a considerable sum. Messrs. Goldstone and Cohen who gave us the story, say they pointed out the direction the man should take to get the police and he hurried off to seek their aid. They were so perturbed on meeting the unfortunate man that they forgot to ask him his name and they wonder how it was that his aggressors did not kill him.
