AIR ACTIVITY.

BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, May 10. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)-The lull continues along our fronts. Our airmen continue to do wonderful work. The number of enemy machines brought down in recent days is remarkably high. It is reported that Lieut. Von Richthofen, a brother of the late famous Germanairman, recently fell in the Somme valley and fractured his skull and is unlikely to fly again.

CO-OPERATION WILL COUNT. LONDON, May 10.

(Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)-Field Marshal Haig expresses his deep appreciation of the services of the artillery in the Somme and Lys battles. He adds that the infantry was the first to admit the inestimable value of artillery support. The British commander in chief is confilent that the reliance of each arm upthe whole-hearted and selfsacrificing co-operation of the other is the greatest possible assurance that all further assaults will be met and defeated.

WILL ENFORCE CONSCRIPTION.

LONDON, May 10. Lieut.-Gen. Sir Bryan Mahon, Commander-in-Chief of the forces in Ireland, announced publicly last night that he was to leave Ireland. He said he did not know who his successor would be. This confirms rumors current for several days that important changes in the military command in Ireland are pending.
