### Nfld. Industries.

The quarry at Port au Port is working to capacity this season, shipping from fifty-eight to sixty thousand tons of limestone per month. Churn drills are now in operation, in charge of David Glavine, and blasts shoot from twenty to thirty thousand tons each. The deposit of limestone at Port au Port is said to be one of the greatest in the world. It is seven miles thick, and as it taken one hundred years to make one foot by natural process, it will be interesting to calculate just how long this deposit has been forming.

Oil is always found in the vicinity of limestone, and if the theory that mineral oil is resultant from shell fish remains, holds, it would be reasonable to expect to find the oil fields of Newfoundland rank with the best in the world, as stated by Professor Henry who is now at Parsons Pond.

At one place, Three Guts, North of Port au Port, oil is continually flowing through the sand in the land wash. At Flat Point, Port au Port, there are eleven abandoned oil wells all yet containing oil, one of them flowing intermittently.

A small shipment of chrome ore was made a few days ago from Bluff Head by the Messrs. Thompson. Chrome being one of the principal raw necessities is now eagerly sought by mining men. Work reaches us from Great Gull Lake, N.D.B., that the

ore bodies which are being prospected there, continue to show well. One shaft has been sunk fifty feet and the average assay of the ore taken from from this is about eight per cent. copper.

Smelting operations, this season, will be carried on at Little Bay for the manufacture of commercial copper from the Lake deposits. Several shipments of this article have already been made to New York, but it has been found less expensive to have it treated on the ground, owing to excessive freight and other rates.

Great preparations are being made at Springdale, N.D.B., for the fall herring fishery. About twenty new houses are being put up, and three saw mills are now in operation. There are also probabilities that another new vessel will be built there during the winter.

### Privation in France.

The bread ration of the French soldiers has been cut from 25 ounces to 21 ounces, the civilian bread allowance 10 ounces per day, which is about one-third of the average bread consumption of the French peasant or workman. The manufacture of crackers and pastry has been absolutely prohibited. Consumption of sugar has been reduced 40 per cent. and of rice 61 per cent. The import of dried vegetables has been reduced 52 per cent. and of fats 48 per cent.

### Flower Service at Bay Roberts.

On Sunday last at St. Matthew's Church, Bay Roberts, the services took the form of a special nature and the sermons by the Rector, Rev. A. Stirling, were of a most helpful and inspiring character. It was a day to be long remembered by all who were privileged to be present. The Rector had intimated to the parishioners his intention of holding a memorial or flower service, and they willingly weeks ago, started in to clean up and beautify the last resting place of their loved ones in God's Acre. The day was fairly fine, and many visitors from neighboring places attended the services. The sermons during the day were appropriate to the occasion. The subject at the morning service was taken from the words, "To me to live is Christ; to die is gain." The flower service in the afternoon commenced at 3 o'clock, and at this service the Sunday school children occupied the centre of the church. The subject of the Rector's address was "The three stages of human existence." At the close of this service the large congregation present joined in the procession to the cemetery, the Rector leading, being followed by the choir, school children, relatives and friends. Arriving at the cemetery, an appropriate hymn was sung, and after special prayers by the Rector, the large assemblage reverently placed the flowers on the graves of their loved ones as tokens of remembrance. The scene was a touching and never to be forgotten one. In the graveyard are the monuments (recently erected) of three heroes who gave their lives for King and Country, and although their bodies are resting somewhere in France, they were not forgotten, for the British flag was placed over the plots in front of the tombstones. At the evening service the Rector again occupied the pulpit, and although he had already preached two powerful and thoughtful sermons, he excelled himself in his evening address on "Imagination," which was his subject, and the large congregation were carried in thought to all those brave boys who had laid down their lives that we may live, and the preacher in eloquent and touching language brought them in imagination to the Paradise of God, where they are resting. The musical portion of the service was under the guidance of Mr. Herbert Stirling, the organist of St. Thomas's Church, who manipulated the keyboard at all the services. After the evening service, Mr. Stirling kindly gave a short recital so as to exhibit the tone and power of the fine little organ. The chancel was beautifully decorated with choice house flowers kindly lent for the occasion. The services were thoroughly enjoyed and left a lasting impression on all, especially on

### "Eyewitness" Furnishes Facts


Editor Evening Telegram.


