





That the maintenance of undenominaional boarding houses, or hotels, and the provision of the fullest rights of entry for religious instruction for all denominations who made up the union shall form part of such a scheme; that a clergyman shall be appointed to preside over the hostel of its own particular denomination and that all such clergymen be on the regular staff, and give religious instruction to the students of the institution, who shall belong to their own branch of the faith.
