Pretty, saucy Nell Gwynn, of the

dancing blue eyes, laughing red lips, and auburn hair, all curls and tendrils; Frances Jennings, who drove every gallant at Charles's Court to distraction by her charms and caprices before she married "handsome Dick Talbot" and blossomed into a duchess; Lady Sarah Lennox, the haughty and capricious beauty, who refused a crown when the boy-king, George III., laid it at her feet—and so on through the long list of fair women who have graced it at our Royal Court.

Thus they leap to life again for us, these fair women of a dead past, almost as vividly as when they trod the earth in their pride and splendour and beauty—Perdita, whom the "first gentleman in Europe" loved one day and left the next; Mrs. Jordan, the "little pickle" whom our sailor King led to the altar; the "gorgeous Lady Blessington"; and Lady Hamilton, the blacksmith's daughter, who lived to be an ambassador, the bosom friend of a Queen, and Nelson's "Emma" and idol.

Lady Hamilton still looks down on us from many a canvas by Romney and Reynolds, Lawrence and Hoppner; and we can feast our eyes on the charms which won for her Romney's description of "the most perfect woman in the world," and which are thus catalogued:—"A profusion of auburn hair, which fell to her very knees; a broad forehead; finely-arched and pencilled eyebrows; blue eyes, whose shyness was strangely winning; a delicate aquiline nose, a short upper lip, and a dainty mouth; a chin of incomparable shapeliness, good teeth, a complexion pure and bright as an angel's colour; an expression of seraphic sweetness; a head set like a piece of antique art on a long fair neck; a figure tall and slight, and perfect in its modelling. Nor in our list, necessarily incomplete, of this world's most beautiful woman, must we overlook Peg Woffington, "the most fascinating daughter of Eve," of whom Charles Roade draws the following charming picture:—"She had a head of beautiful form, perched like a bird upon a throat shapely and smooth as a column of alabaster; a symmetrical brow; black eyes full of fire and tenderness; and a delicious mouth with a hundred varying expressions. But she had one feature more remarkable than all—her eyebrows, which were jet-black and arched like a rainbow, with a flexibility that made other faces upon the stage look sleepy beside Margaret Woffington's. In person she was considerably over the middle height; and so finely formed that one could not determine the exact character of her figure. At one time it seemed all stateliness; at others, elegance personified and flowing voluptuousness. She was Juno Psyche, Hebe by turns; and, for aught we know, at will."

NOTICE.

Under and by virtue of "An Act respecting the General Hospital" (6 George V., Cap. XIX.), and with the approval of the Governor-in-Council, the Board of Governors of the St. John's Hospital hereby give notice that they have fixed and prescribed the following scale of fees to be levied from and paid by all persons who occupy beds or undergo treatment at the Hospital. The scale is to come into operation on the 1st day of January, 1921.

SCALE OF FEES.

Every person receiving treatment in the General Hospital shall, after December 31st next, pay fees according to the following scale:
Persons admitted to the public wards \$1.00 per day; persons occupying private rooms \$10.00 per week, in addition to the daily fees of \$1.00.
Every applicant for admission to the Hospital must bring with him or forward to the Superintendent of the Hospital certificate signed by a duly registered physician that such applicant is a proper subject for Hospital treatment.

Under the provisions of the General Hospital Act, 1915, all patients who are unable to pay fees shall be required to bring with them a certificate of their inability to pay, which shall be signed by the resident relieving officer, or where there is no such officer, by a Justice of the Peace, or Clergyman or other responsible person. The fees of such patients thereupon become payable by the Commissioner of Public Charity by virtue of the said Act.
