Newfoundland First.

At the Ecumenical Conference of the Methodist Church, the Rev. Dr. G. J. Bond said that "Newfoundland was the first mission-ground of Methodism. It was introduced there by the Rev. Lawrence Coughlan, an Irishman, who had been one of John Wesley's preachers. That was in 1766 one year before Philip Embury introduced Methodism into what is now the United States. So the first Methodist conversion in the New World was in Newfoundland. The first Methodist class meeting was in Newfoundland. Mr. Coughlan formed it within the year of his arrival. More than that, in 1817 there was sent from Newfoundland the first contribution to the Wesleyan Missionary Society outside of Britain, preceding indeed any from Ireland. That contribution amounted to some one hundred and fifty dollars. Last year Newfoundland's contribution to Methodist Missions amounted to about thirty-five thousand dollars. This is the Book of Genesis of Methodism's great world-work from which I am quoting. Newfoundland was first in its first chapter. That is a bit of our church's history which some have forgotten, and very many never knew."

But Newfoundland has other firsts in her history. She is the first colony—the most ancient colony—of the great British Empire. John Cabot discovered her in 1497, and Henry the Seventh has this entry in his munificence in his privy-purse account book: "To himme that founde the new isle 410." My native city of St. John's was the first town in the New World. Sir Humphrey Gilbert planted the Royal Standard there in 1583, and took possession of town and island in the name of his sovereign—good Queen Bess. And he speaks of the settlement as being even then a well-known and popular place. That was in 1583. Where was New York then? Where was Montreal? Where was Melbourne? And there are other significant firsts which Newfoundland claims with pride. To her shores was laid the first Atlantic cable, when, as Whittier puts it, "the lonely bay of Trinity, the virgin shores untrod stoops down beside the silent sea to hear the voice of God." And only a few years ago, William Marconi flew a kite carrying an aerial on the slopes of Signal Hill above St. John's and listened in faith at his receiver, till, at the appointed moment, the symbol of the letter S carried by the waves of the mysterious ether, came to his ear—the first wireless message whispered from Europe to America—The Wesleyan.

Church of the Redeemer Holds Jubilee Service.

Following the celebration of the jubilee of the Church of the Redeemer, Avenue Road, a preaching mission is being held this week, with Dr. Edgar Jones, formerly of St. John's, Newfoundland, and now of Newark, Delaware, as missionary. Dr. Jones preached at both services yesterday, the church being filled to hear the great preacher. He was assisted by the pastor, Rev. Canon James, A. F. Barr and Rev. W. F. Wallace. At the morning service Dr. Jones emphasized the necessity of Christians rebuilding their altars and consecrating themselves afresh to the living God. In the evening his subject was from the text: "But God forbid that I should glory save in the cross of Our Lord Jesus Christ." The cross of Christ was the key to Paradise, while the cross of Christ was to the Greeks foolishness, and to the Jews a stumbling block, it was the power of God unto those who believed. A man might be religious, the speaker thought, yet not godly. The heathen who offered prayer after prayer were religious, but not godly. Those who came to church Sunday after Sunday were religious. "But are you godly?" he asked.

The week-day services are to be held at four in the afternoon and eight in the evening, except on Saturday, while a service will be held for children on Friday afternoon.—Toronto Mail.
