Caution Necessary.

At the present stage of the Railway situation, the Government will be well advised if they walk warily, and not permit themselves to be inveigled into something that looks like a bargain, but might very well be a gold brick. The assertion of the Company that they do not intend to operate the Railway or steamship service is, as the Daily News puts it, absurd. From the layman's point of view they have fallen down on their contract, and by so doing have, to all intents and purposes, defaulted. What then about enforcing Section 38 of the Railway Act of 1898, the text of which was published in the Telegram on Saturday. The Railway itself is the security for the fulfilling of all contracts made from 1893 on, and forfeiture of the Railway is the penalty for default. It is not, we think, the business of the Colony to make good losses incurred by the Company in operations. Yet certain misguided politicians thought fit to do so, for two years, thus establishing a precedent of which the Company was not slow to take advantage. Because of this the Government finds itself painfully impaled on both horns of a dilemma. It has to do one of two things, but being between the devil and the deep sea it has not yet decided which fate to choose. When Railways are on the bargain counter it were as well to examine closely into the terms of sale. There may be a variety of Ethiopian in the fence. These should be discovered and pulled out. It is not the Government that will have to pay the piper for future errors of judgment, but the people. And Heaven knows they have been severely bled in the past in settlement of claims and operating expenses. Over two million dollars in two years is a bit thick, when it is taken into consideration that excessive freight and passenger rates were charged by the Company, who in the face of this, claim that they cannot carry on the service only at a loss. Paying both ways is not a form of amusement that commends itself to the people of Newfoundland, and it is to be hoped that in the de... on the Railway Resolution... the House to-day, the Government like Agag of old will "tread delicately."

That Tariff Reduction

The announcement is made by the Government press with a great flourish of trumpets, that having the welfare of the fishermen solely at heart, a reduction in duties has been made on certain items of fishery supplies, whereby a saving of from two hundred and fifty and three hundred thousand dollars have been made to the men who prosecute this industry. This act of the Government is only half complete, but perhaps they have done the best they could under the circumstances. Be

that as it may, the regular tariff rate on the articles enumerated has not been changed. All that has been done is the lifting of the Super-tax of twenty-five per cent. and the Sales-tax of five per cent. on kerosene, gasoline, long rubber boots and oil clothes, and at the demand of the members of the Opposition, including leather fishing boots in the schedule. But the pernicious surtax of ten per cent. still remains. The regular tariff rate is still existent. On kerosene oil, five cents per gallon, plus ten per cent.; on gasoline, six cents per gallon, plus ten per cent.; on rubber goods, 40 p.c. ad valorem, plus ten per cent.; on oil clothing, 80 p.c. ad valorem, plus ten per cent.; on leather fishing boots, 40 p.c. ad valorem, plus ten per cent., making the duty on kerosene 5 1/2 cents per gallon, on gasoline 6 and three-fifths cents, on rubber and leather fishing boots 44 p.c. ad val. It is something, of course, by way of concession to the toilers, but as Sir Michael Cashin intimated on Friday, the Prime Minister could have gone farther and remitted the whole duty on kerosene and gasoline, when imported for and exclusively used by fishermen in the operation of motor boats. The loss to the Colony on revenue would more than have been made up in increased production. Taken as a comparison with the estimate of revenue for the fiscal year 1922-23, or even the current collection for 1921-22, the sum total of the duties remitted is but a drop in the bucket. As the new schedule came into effect at once, and without previous warning to the trade, it stands to reason that there will be a loss incurred by business people on the articles named, which have paid full duty, equivalent to the sum of the Super and Sales Taxes, unless the Government makes provision for a drawback when such are sold directly to fishermen.

Our Book Review.

"ROCCOCO" BY MARJORIE BOWEN.

Marjorie Bowen always seems to satisfy the wants of the student of history and tastes of the reader of a good story at one and the same time. To the former she gives an insight into some of the minor but none the less interesting events in history, an insight such as could never be obtained from the closest perusal of history books. To the latter, the author presents a mixture of fact and fiction, with a sufficient interest to satisfy the most exacting reader. Memorial Service.

Unveiling of Tablet to Men of Gower Street Church Who Fell in Great War—Vast Congregation Hear Inspiring Address.



Yesterday forenoon the objective of numerous worshippers was Gower St. Methodist Church, and hundreds wended their way to the sacred edifice to participate in the Memorial Service and Unveiling and dedication of a mural tablet to the men of that congregation who fell in the Great War. By eleven o'clock, the time set for the opening, the commodious church was thronged with worshippers. The centre pews of the auditorium were reserved for relatives of the sacred dead, and official representatives, including the Excellency of the Governor and suite, the Prime Minister, the Mayor, officials of the Church, delegations from the Great War Veterans, Church Lads Brigade, Highlanders, etc. A Guard of Honour under Lieut. Garland occupied a seat next the rostrum, while representatives of the Army and Navy stood guard by the Memorial Tablet. In the rostrum were the Rev. E. W. Forbes, B.D., pastor of the Church, Rev. M. Fenwick, D.D., President of the Conference, Rev. A. C. Clayton, C.F., Senior Curate of St. Thomas's Parish, Rev. T. W. Atkinson and Rev. T. B. Darby, M.A. The Order of Service was as follows:—

Organ Postlude.
The Memorial Tablet is of Bronze and of granite. In the centre is a tablet and distinct lettering are the inscription and names. Above are crossed flags, and over these a shield bearing a carmine head, the emblem of the Regiment, which is surmounted by a laurel wreath while streamers of laurel drape over the sides. The workmanship is that of Hopkins, Causer and Hopkins of Birmingham, England. At the proper time those having charge of the wreaths made their presentations, and in a short while the foot of the tablet was covered with a shimmering mass of flowers and foliage, silent tribute and honor to the gallant gentlemen whose names are inscribed on the Roll of Fame of Gower Street Church. The plaintive notes of the "Last Post" ended this portion of the ceremony and was followed by the note of triumph in the hymn beginning "O valiant hearts who to your glory came." The address by Dr. J. A. Robinson was a masterpiece of eloquence and diction, and was listened to with rapt attention by the huge congregation. We hope to publish it in full to-morrow.
