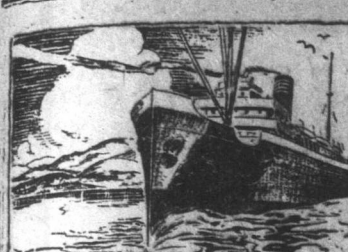

At St. Michael's

The Parish of St. Michael and All
Angels is observing its Patronal Festi-
val, and yesterday was a landmark
in the history of this church. Not only
did the various services exhibit the
Festival note, but they were attend-
ed by persons in authority who lent
distinction to the Feast. In the morn-
ing the Rural Dean of Avalon, Rev.
A. E. Taik, visited the church in his
official capacity and preached at the
11 o'clock Eucharist. Before his ser-
mon the rev. gentleman expressed his
joy at being present at such a beauti-
ful service, and congratulated the
Parish on having a Rector who has
laboured so well, and the Priest on
having such a devoted congregation
to assist his labours. He then
preached an appropriate and eloquent
sermon on the words of the Lord's
Prayer, "Thy Will be Done in Earth
as it is in Heaven," dealing with the
ministry of the Angels.

In the evening the Lord Bishop of
Newfoundland attended the church
and preached after Evensong. His
Lordship's text was from Psalm
CXXII: "I was glad when they said
unto me, 'We will go into the House
of the Lord,' and he lucidly explained
the meaning of the Church, as the
House of Prayer and the place where
the majesty of God is realized. He
urged the people of St. Michael's to
make such use of their church that
men may take 'note of them that
they have been with Jesus.'"

All the services of yesterday were
celebrated with the reverence and
dignity of Catholic ceremonial cus-
tomary at this church and were at-
tended by large congregations. The
offerings of the day exceeded the ex-
pectations of the officials. The Festi-
val will close on Tuesday night
with a social re-union in the Parish
Hall for which a special programme
is being prepared. At the close of the
service last night the Bishop an-
nounced that the forthcoming Mis-
sion to be held in January next has his
approval and blessing.

Secure Big Contract

FARQUHAR BROS., LTD., OF THIS
CITY, WILL DO THE PLUMBING,
ETC., ON BIG Nfld. HOTEL.

One of the biggest plumbing con-
tracts ever secured by a local firm
has been awarded to the firm of Far-
quhar Bros., Ltd., local heating con-
tractors, who successfully tendered
for the plumbing, heating and sheet
metal work to be installed in the New-
foundland Royal Hotel, St. John's,
Newfoundland.

When the project of erecting the
Newfoundland Royal Hotel, to cost
\$1,000,000, was laid about, Farquhar
Bros., Ltd., immediately got in touch
with the company handling the scheme
and, in competition with other plum-
bing heating contractors throughout
Canada and Newfoundland, were
awarded the contract.

Securing this contract which is the
largest of its kind ever received by a
Halifax firm, means that a large num-
ber of plumbers and steamfitters of
Halifax will be employed, as those
who at present constitute the perma-
nent staff of Farquhar Bros., will be
sent to St. John's immediately, to start
work on this big undertaking. Mr.
James Farquhar, president of the firm,
says he believes that wherever pos-
sible, Canadian materials will be used
in the big contract.

Work on this new \$1,000,000 hotel
will be started right away, as the hotel
must be finished by the 1st of May
next year.—Halifax Morning Chroni-
cle.

The Price of Milk

Editor Evening Telegram.
Dear Sir,—I notice in the papers
lately there have been several refer-
ences to the price of milk. Every-
thing has gone down in price since the
close of the war except milk. If any-
one called the milkmen unscrupulous
producers they would be offended, yet
that seems to be the only term to de-
scribe them. Milk is selling in Canada
and U.S. for 10 and 12 cents per quart.
Why is it that we have to pay 18 and
20 cents? Do you know what the wo-
men of the Bronx, N.Y., did under simi-
lar circumstances? They refused to
take milk for three or four mornings
and left it on the hands of the pro-
ducers who were very glad to reduce the
price to a reasonable rate. Now here
is a job for the Woman's Franchise
League. We want better milk at
cheaper prices. Is there a sufficient
number of women interested in milk
prices to effect a reform? People who
can not do without milk can get pre-
pared milk cheaper and better than
much of the local brand.
Is any milkman decent enough to
announce a reduction in price? If so
the others will follow. Anyhow the
milkmen are keeping up the price not-
withstanding the fact that feeds have
fallen over fifty per cent. in price. Let
us make some effort to get out of the
clutches of the petty profiteer. Who
will lead the way?

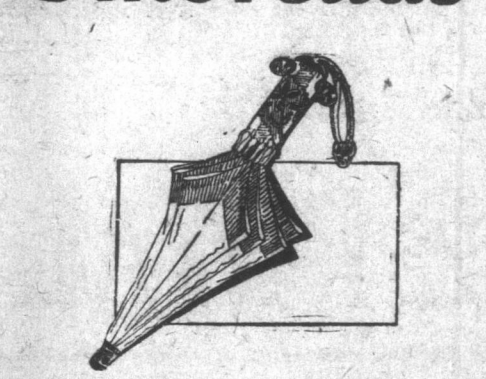
