This is another consequence of the want of preparation of the Macdonald-Cartier administration. If patents were to issue now, they would, of course, only apply to the old Province of Canada, or to New Brunswick or Nova Scotia. Hence the necessity for the early passage of a patent bill.

THE BANK OF UPPER CANADA.

The Trustees of the Bank of Upper Canada have recently published an account of the first year's results of their efforts to realize on the assets and pay off the creditors. On the 13th November, 1866, when the Bank closed, the liabilities amounted to \$2,572,007 51. They are, at the end of a year, \$2,062,408 10. That is a fraction over half a million has been paid during the year. At this rate, it will take five years to wind up. But whether the progress will be as rapid in the future may well be doubted. At the time the trust was put into their hands there was \$41,000 cash in hand, of which there is less than \$10,000 left. Besides that, they had government and municipal debentures, and realized payment on the most available bills discounted and on judgments.
