American Despatches

New York, 13.—Tribune's Atlanta, Ga., special says that a large number of Republicans from all parts of the State believe death certain if they go home. A desperate attempt was made at Waynesboro' on Sunday last to murder Rev. Mr. Pilman, an Elder of the Methodist Church.

London special says to-day Queen Victoria accepted a letter from Mr. Heyerdal Johnson, praying for an audience to be granted him for the purpose of taking formal leave of Her Majesty on his retirement from office. The Queen replied by appointing the audience for to-morrow, when Mr. Johnson will present Mr. B. Moran, Secretary of Legation, who will assume the duties of the office until the arrival of Mr. Motley.

Herold's St. Domingo letter says that a revolution under Cabral is gathering force. Engagements had taken place on the 13th and 23rd, in which the forces of Balz were defeated, with the loss of Garica.

Herold's Cuban letter says that a revolution of some magnitude is reported to have broken out in Porto Rico. Several British men of war were moving actively about the Gulf, and the squadron was being interested.

Herold's Washington special says that Secretary Fish informed the Spanish Minister that the mode of warfare proposed in Valmaceda's proclamation was repugnant to civilization, and could not be tolerated, as its execution might involve the death of many American citizens who are in no way connected with the insurrection.




