The Pacific Railway Bill.

The Pacific Railway Bill was again before the House on Friday, when it was passed through Committee, and ordered for a third reading. The Opposition moved several important amendments, which if carried would have divested the measure of some of its worst features, but with the exception of two or three they were objected to by the Government and consequently defeated.

Mr. Mackenzie, after once more pointing out the dangerous unconstituted character of the measure, from the extraordinary functions delegated by the bill to the Government, moved an amendment to expunge the provisions enacting that the Governor-in-Council shall assume the right of chartering and granting powers to railway companies.

Mr. Mackenzie then moved an amendment, providing that actual settlers might enter on lands unsold or unoccupied belonging to the Government or the Railway Company, on terms to be decided by Parliament, and that portions of the country should be reserved for free grants.

The Washington Treaty.

The negotiations ancient the Supplemental Treaty are not yet broken off, but there is now little hope left that any agreement will be come to about it between Britain and the United States.

In the House of Lords the same night, Earl Derby urged on the Government to produce the text of the Supplemental Treaty, but Earl Granville refused, and in reply to a remark made by Earl Grey, indignantly replied that the Government had involved the country in trouble.

A Hint to Wool-growers.

The price of wool this season will greatly increase the clip for the next. The demand has stimulated the enlargement of flock this spring, and has prevented the consumption of sheep for table use.

Farmers must not forget that while a crowded market is attended with results that are disastrous to their interests, a forced market is a beacon of falsity to encourage the production of an article, yet does not give such tone to an industry as is profitable to both producer and consumer.

In the debate on Mr. Blake's bill to promote the independence of the Senate, Tom Ferguson, it is said, threatened to slap the Hon. E. B. Wood's face. This is the good old Tory argument.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Ottawa, May 31.

On the Canada Pacific Railway Bill being called, Sir George E. Cartier announced that it had been decided to accept certain amendments suggested by the Opposition.

Some amendments with regard to the route and terms were voted down. Mr. Mackenzie, after once more pointing out the dangerous unconstituted character of the measure, from the extraordinary functions delegated by the bill to the Government, moved an amendment to expunge the provisions enacting that the Governor-in-Council shall assume the right of chartering and granting powers to railway companies.
