The procerdiags of the Weft-India Planters and Merchants at their Meeting on Friday, and the Petition they have prepared for fignature on the fubject of Ainerican Intercourfe, afford no adatitional teftimony to the wifdom of thofe meafures which Government is faid to have in contemplation with refpect to the Colonial trade; they only prove that a number of perfons connected with that trade fuppofe the plan beneficial to their interefts, or at any rate are willing, under prefent difficulties, that the experiment thould be tried. It is a mater of courfe that this part of the community fhould come forward to promote a meafure sdopted in deference to their complaints, and with a view to their particular advantage. It is alfo natural that thefe gentlemen fhould wave any minute or anxious confideration of the manner in which other claffes, or the fate in general, may be affected by the propofed line of policy. Their bufinefs, acording to the practice of the world, is to urge the point by all means in their power, and leave others to find out their own dangers, and guard their interefts, if they can.
The queftion to be confidered by Par_ liament when deliberating on the projected oceafures will be, what proportion the benefit to bereaped by the Weft-India Planters will bear to the injury inflicted on other parts of the community, and on the nation in general. Now, on thefe points it will certainly be prudent to receive other reprefentations than thofe 4 ine Weftindra Merchants and Plan. tere, who are naturally difpofed to entertain too fanguine expectations from the charge of policy intended for their relief, and who will be the laft to perceive or of eavil that may be entailed by it upon of eavil that may be entailed by it upon
the country and its dependencies. If the fhip-owners and merchants of Grear Britain, and the people of her N. American Colonies are confidered as interefted parties, it is at leaft fit that their voices hould be liftened to on this fubject, in oppofition to thofe of perfons notlef's terefted, and Parliament will Atih balance between the confliling fota ments. But in forming their conclufion, they will recollect that they are not merely trying a caufe between colony and colony, between the claims of one
trade and another; there is a great and trade and another; there is a great and paramount intereft which imperioufly demands attention, the intereft of England herfeif is a iviaritime State. Whether Britain Shall yield up thofe commercial Jaws which may almoft be deemed the char. aeter of her naval afcendancy, abandoning, at this feafon of peace, one of the fairef fources of that ftrength fo neceffary to her welfare and independence, is a queftion not to be decided folely upon the oppofing reprefentations of two or more agricultural or mercantiie commu_ nities, however important and refpectable. Let the parties be fairly heard; let every reafonable allowance, be made for zeal, for intereft, for the workings of hope and fear on either fide; but even if the slaims be in other refpects equally bai-
anced, thofe ought to predominate in the end which thall be found manifeftly coinciding with the fureft and moft approved national policy.
The Weft-India Petitioners encourage one another to frengthen the hands of Goverment; we alfo are anxious that they fhould be frengthened for all pur. pofes which a wife and confiderate Government can be defirous of accomplifhing, but thofe who are called upon to affift in this office fhould be certain that the hands are ftretched out to fave and not to deftroy,-At all events, if it be a work of charity to Atrengthen the hands of our rulers, it is a labour not lefs laudable to open their eyes.

The Greek Deputies to be fent to the Congrefs at wafhington will embark for North-Atmerica on board this veffel,

It has been fo often flated, that all differences were fettled, and that there would be no war, that a freflitpofitive decleration to the fame effect is not cal-

 furance. We have conffantly afferte that nothing was decided with refpect to thefe differences; and, in fact the complexion of affuirs has hitherto been altogether of a warlike nature. But great efforts have certainly been lately made, both by England and Auftria to prevent Ruffia from svailing herfelf of the prefent favourable conjuncture for carrying the defigns of Catharine into complete execution ; and though nothing can be more hazardous than, in a cale like this, were national feeling, national policy, and frong interefts, are in queftion, to predicate of fuch a Perfonage at the Emperor Alexander, what courfe he will follow, we think it incumbent on us to fay, that there is at leaft fome ground for believing the negotiations now car_ rying on at Vienna may end in a peaceable arrangement. We wifh, at the fame time, to have it underftood, in order that no one may be mifled by us on fo impertant a fubject, that we give no opinion.
