Belation of the Church to Educational Schemes Discussed by Distinguished Divisors.

London, July 10.—The Canterbury Diocesan Conference has been discussing the request of the archbishop yesterday spoke on education in America. Free education, he said, was recognized as a fact, whether desirable or not it was felt to be of the utmost importance to have some Jand of education as extensive as possible. Against free schools there was a religious objection; also the objection that the teaching was apt to become mechanical. He said an attempt was being made to establish everywhere church schools but that as yeb no great progress had been made.
