The Park Bylaw To Be Enforced-Bet-ter Water to Drink. The Park Bylaw To Be Enforced-Better Water to Drink.

TOEONTO, Aug. 1.— Chief of Police Grassett says the park bylaw will be enforced on Sunday as it was last Sunday. We don't need the help of the military, and the work will be done as it was last Sunday by uniformed and plain clothes officers.

The following is the result of the last analysis of city water: Total solida, 13.4; volatile matter, 68; chlorine as chlorides, 5.; free ammonia, .0165; sibuminoid ammonia, .0610; oxygen consumed in four hours, .2900; according to Muter's scale, .03550.
