LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—A new telephone office has been opened
at Hensall.

—The Thirteenth Battalion, Hamilton,
has decided to visit Berlin on May 24 in
preference to London.

—The medical examinations at the West-
ern University have concluded. A large
number of students wrote.

—Mr. C. Macdonnell, Q.C., will be
Crown prosecutor at the London Assizes,
which will open on Monday, and at the
Sandwich Assizes, which commence on
May 6.

—The Bodegas property, Richmond street
north, was put up at auction at Brunton's
rooms yesterday afternoon. The high-
est offer was \$3,950, but the property
was withdrawn.

—Manson Bowers, driver of one of the
South London street cars, was fixing a re-
volver on Sunday, when the weapon unex-
pectedly went off. The ball went through
his hand and badly lacerated it. The
accident will lay him off for some weeks.

—Evangelists Parlone and Crombie and
Archdeacon Phair, of Rupert's Land, made
forable addresses at the Memorial Church
Lenten mission last evening. The evange-
lists conclude their work here this
evening and go Woodstock, thence to
Port Hope.

—Rival pa-erokers on Clarence street
created a good deal of amusement for a
crowd of spectators yesterday. One of
them pulled off his coat, rolled up his sleeves,
and defied the other to "come on," but the
challenge was not accepted. A Police Court
settlement will probably result.

—The police commissioners met yesterday
morning and appointed Eli Day and Arthur
W. Rowell to positions on the department
made vacant by the death of P. C. Pope and
the resignation of R. C. Chalmers. Both
the new men are six feet high. They will
go on duty on the first day of April
and May respectively.

—The funeral of the late Wesley Warner
and his daughters, who were killed on the
C. P. R. crossing in London township on
Saturday evening, took place from their
late residence, con. 6, London township,
yesterday morning. The large attendance
showed the esteem of their many friends.
The coroner's inquest will be continued
this evening.

—Dr. McArthur is visiting the New York
hospitals.

—The robins have commenced to arrive
in this neighborhood.

—The Orange Grand Lodge met in St.
Thomas yesterday afternoon.

—Mr. Francis Cowley, of Quebec street,
has returned from a visit to Great Britain.

—Rev. Messrs. Sawyers, of Westminster,
Henderson, of Appin, and Simpson, of
Melbourne, were in the city Monday on
business connected with the Presbytery of
London.

—Rev. W. J. Clark, of this city, ad-
dressed a large meeting under the auspices
of the Christian Endeavor Society at the
First Presbyterian Church, St. Marys, Mon-
day evening.

—Mr. Charles Lilley, of East London, has
laid a complaint against Mayor Taylor,
charging him with abusive language. The
case will come before the police magis-
trate Monday morning.

—Mr. James Fox, of Gray street, for a
number of years conductor on the Santa
branch of the G. T. R., died Monday.
Conductor Fox, of St. Thomas, is a son of
deceased. The funeral took place from St.
Peter's Cathedral yesterday morning.

—Re O'Gorman at Toronto Monday.
Hoyes, for the defence, committed a last
lunatic, moved for an order for payment
out of the estate of the lunatic in court of
the sum of \$45, as reported by the master
at London. J. F. Edgar for the inspector
of asylums. Order made. Costs out of
the estate.

—Dr. N. A. Forward, clerk of Le Grand
Hotel, Fort Smith, Ark., is visiting his
parents, London West, for over ten years
since he left London and he is having quite
an interesting time hunting up old ac-
quaintances. He was at one time with the
Tumach House and also the Revere
House, this city.

—Waterworks Inspector Platt and his
son Edward narrowly escaped being victims
of another railroad accident at the Rectory
street crossing of the G. T. R. Until they
had driven onto the railway they were not
aware that the Erie train was coming
along. The horse was turned down the
track and fortunately enough one of the
buggy wheels broke in a rut, throwing the
occupants to one side and saving their
lives.

—Mr. George Munro, brother of Mr.
Samuel Munro, of John Marshall & Co., is
on a month's visit to his brother. He is
manager of the New Oriental Bank at
Madras, India, and for the past five years
has been visiting his relatives in England.
It is fifteen years since he and his brother
Samuel last met, and both have progressed
considerably in the world during that
time. When Mr. Munro returns to India
a few months hence he will assume the
management of the Oriental Bank at
Calcutta.

Tupper and the Trunk.
An Ottawa correspondent writes: One
of the proprietors of the Temiscouata Rail-
way, who was in Ottawa yesterday, spoke
very strongly about Sir Charles Tupper's
threats to withhold assistance from that
road because the Grand Trunk Company
refused to support the Tory party at the
recent elections. "The Tupper does not own
this country," he said, "and Sir John will
find that in attacking the Grand Trunk
he has made the greatest blunder of his life.
But I don't think Sir Charles is the Gov-
ernment. If he is, then somebody else will
be the Government very soon."

The Scottish Concert.
MacLennan's Royal Edinburgh Concert
Company gave a first-class entertainment in
the Grand Opera House last night. The
soloists, Misses Steel and Ross, made
an excellent impression. Miss Steel has
a sweet voice of considerable compass. She
sang in a very pleasing manner several
standard Scottish melodies. Probably
her best effort was in "Gin a Body,"
sang in response to an encore.

Miss Ross is an old favorite in London,
having sung with the Balmoral Choir last
winter. Her selections were warmly ap-
plauded. "Auld Robin Gray" and "The
Bitter Land" were given with much spirit.
Mr. A. Enlayser and his band had a
fine stage presence. He gave "The
Battle of Thirling Bridge" and "Tell Her
I Love Her So" with splendid effect. Mr.
James MacLennan was also effective.
"I Fear No Fate" elicited an encore.

Mr. C. F. Ferguson sang humorous songs
and told a witty Scotch story. He was
laughed in a very telling manner, and the
audience laughing. The part singing was
grand. "Auld Robin Gray" was given mag-
nificently by the four principal soloists, and
the trio, "Maiden Fair," also proved a gem.
The latter was encored and "Willie
Brewed a Peck o' Maut" was given. Mr.
MacLennan is an all-round dancer and is
very nimble on his legs. His Scottish
bicycle in character could not be excelled.
Some good violin solos were given by Mr.
J. Guittion.

TOO LIBERAL.

**Movement to Discipline Two Popular
New York Pastors.**

Many readers of the ADVERTISER who
can recall with pleasure the ministrations
of Rev. W. S. Hainford while that gentle-
man was curate of St. Paul's Cathedral in
London, will be interested in the following
dispatch from New York: "Some clergy-
men of this town propose to discipline two
of the best known and most popular pastors
of New York, Dr. W. S. Hainford, rector
of St. George's parish, and Dr. Heber New-
ton, of All-Saints Church. It is the disci-
plinary committee to curb the independence
of those two preachers they will, so to
speak, twig several clergymen of lesser
note and ability, who also are located
in the diocese of New York, of which
Dr. Henry C. Potter is bishop. Their
offense seems to be too great 'liberal-
ity' of view. The influence of the ex-
ample of Drs. Newton and Hainford is held
to be pernicious, it is said, particularly in
view of the statement that the latter has in-
vited a Unitarian to occupy the pulpit of
St. George's and preach to the people of
that parish on Good Friday. To meet this
emergency, to counteract the effect of the
doings of the offending clergymen, and to
set at naught the disapproval and condem-
nation on the alleged uncanonical and un-
clerical practices complained of, a protest
has been prepared, which is now being
signed by the clergy of the diocese of New
York."

CHALMERS' COMPLAINT.
He Was Denied an Audience at the
Police Commissioners' Meeting—
The Reason Why.

P. C. Chalmers made application to the
police commissioners yesterday for a
hearing with respect to a charge made
against him by P. C. Smith and Sergeant
Crawford. It was reported by these of-
ficials that Chalmers while on the sick list
was met on Pall Mall street one
evening with a violin under his
arm going to a party. This Chalmers
characterizes as a falsehood, and says that
he is willing to prove what he says. He
went to the police station this morning to
make good his statements, but the
commissioners refused to grant him
the hearing. Chalmers feels greatly
aggrieved at the treatment he has
received. He affirms that it was his
brother whom the policemen saw on the
evening in question, and accounts for the
mistaken identity by explaining that on
the evening referred to his brother went out
with a violin and wore a hat similar to
that which Chalmers usually wore himself.

CHIEF WILLIAMS' VERSION.
On being interviewed respecting the
case, Chief Williams explained the diffi-
culty. "The case," he said, "is a com-
plex one. It is a case of a man who is
carrying a violin or not," said he. "It
was reported that he was seen on the
street, and a sergeant was dispatched
to his quarters to ascertain whether or not
he was at home, as he should be. The
sergeant reported that he was not at home,
and I accordingly supposed him to be
then said that he would hand in his resig-
nation, which he did, and which has been
accepted."

Crushed by the Cars.
DUTTON, Ont., March 24.—Richard Mc-
Crae, aged 15, in trying to cross the rail-
road track here Saturday afternoon, sprang
on the buffer of a car loaded with staves,
which was about to be shunted. The local
train came up to attach the car and McCrae
was caught between the buffer and the
shunting post and badly crushed. He died
about 10:30 o'clock the same night. He
was the youngest son of Constable Alex.
McCrae. Four years ago another son was
accidentally shot at the Wallacetown fair
by a gun in his own hands, and he has been
a helpless cripple ever since.
