COXEY'S CONTINGENT.

The Tramp Army Moving On, But Its

Proportions Are Decidedly Slim. CANTON, O., March 25 .- Coxey's army of the commonweal moved out of Massillon to-day on schedule time, there being perhaps 75 stragglers in the procession when it started, and 25 less when Canton, eight miles away, was reached.

Carl Brown, chief marshal, who headed the procession, was mounted on a white horse, and was followed by half a dozen aides all mounted on horses belonging to Coxey, who rode in a carriage drawn by a pair of spirited steeds. The procession consisted of the marshals, Coxey, his wife and sister, a bugler, four covered wagons containing camping outfits, baled straw and several quarters of beef, a brass band that played all kinds of music at once and the soldiers of the commonweal on foot. They marched single file and two abreast as it pleased their fancy. With very few exceptions they were hard-looking citizens. This they claimed was not their fault, but the fault of our system of government. The weather was pleasant when the start was made, but the procession was soon overtaken by a severe storm. This had a very depressing tendency, and a number of desertions were reported. The army has had to start on its march without a goddess of peace, as no maiden could be found to assume that role. Instead of a goddess, however, a burly colored man has been enlisted to carry the banner, thus giving the African

race representation in the movement. Coxey's life insurance policy, it was learned to-day, has been revoked, the officials of the company fearing he may meet with a violent end before finishing his

present enterprise. CANTON, O., March 25.—With the ground covered to the depth of half an inch with snow, nothing to eat but a short supply of bread and cheese and a little straw to sleep on the Coxey recruits are in anything but a joyous mood to-night. Murmuring under the big circus tent where the commonweal army is quartered is loud and general. Coxey's soldiers declare that things must improve at once or they will go back to begging. Coxex and his lieutenants are still sanguine and are endeavoring to imbue their followers with confidence by making speeches which, however, do not seem to have the desired effect. Coxey said to-night: "I am now satisfied that I will be followed into Washington by 150,000. As people hear that we have actually started they will begin falling in. Up to this time they have been afraid that we were bluffing. Now they see we mean

business." Dr. Kirtland, of Pittsburg, known as "The Cyclone," arrived at Canton this evening and joined the army. He says he has figured out by astrology that it is to be the grandest move the world has ever seen. Nearly all the noted cranks in Ohio are now here sexpressing their determination to join Coxey. The army is expected to leave Canton at noon to-morrow for Louisville, O. Nearly 50 of Coxey's re-

cruits applied for lodging in the city to-night and were accommodated. SAN ANTONIO, Tex., March 25 .- The Southern Pacific Railroad officials here received word to-night that the United States industrial army of several hundred men were put off the trains at a siding near Finlay, on the El Paso branch, and that trains were run through without stopping. The so-called army broke the lock on the switch and threw it open, causing the next east-bound train to take the siding. The men climbed upon the cars and Conductor Martin pulled them to Finlay, where he tied up the train, pending orders. Orders came for him to keep the train tied up, as the company had decided not to carry the men. Several other trains have arrived at Finlay, and all are tied up, as the army shows no disposition to let any of the trains depart without them. Finlay is an isolated

station and the army will starve if they remain there a few days. Massillon, Ohio, March 25 .- Col. James E. Pepper, of Kentucky, yesterday had an execution for \$24,000 issued against Coxcy and attached the latter's \$40,000 stallion

Acolyte. Coxey bought the horse from Pepper, but paid only \$16,000 on him. DENVER, Col., March 25. -Bert Hamilton, civil engineer and actor, is organizing an army similar to Coxey's to go to Washington and demand the free coinage of silver, the construction of a new railroad from the Ohio River to the Pacific coast and other legislation in the interests of the western portion of the country. The start will be next Sunday and Mr. Hamilton expects to leave Colorado with at least 50,000 and take recruits along the line. The army

Killed by His Daughter and Wife. ATLANTA, Ga., March 25 .- A special from Homer, Banks county, says that F. J. Willis was killed last week by his daughter Lillian and his wife. The news of the tragedy did not leak out for several days, when a son, Francis, told it to some neighbors. The boy testified that his father came home from work about dark, and, setting his bottle of whisky upon the cupboard, called for his supper. Atter beginning to eat his meal a difficulty arose between the father and mother, when Lillian, about 15 years old, struck him with the axe. Rising up and screaming, Willis threw back his head, and the mother took the axe from the girl and cut him across the throat with it. The girl's plea was that she did it to save her mother's life. The jury acquitted the girl.
