Dwelling-House, Stable and Barn Burned.

Mr. Thos. Belcher's Residence in Westminster Destroyed-A lamp Explodes in a Richmond Street Store - A Chimney Fire.

The firemen were kept busy on Saturday from early morning to late at night. They had four runs, the first at T. B. Escott's store in the morning. At 6:55 a.m. a burning chimney took them to John street and again at 9:20 they were called to Miss Wheaton's millinery establishment on Richmond street, near Dundas. A lamp had exploded and spoiled some of the stock, but the damage was not extensive. One of the lady assistants was carried out in a

fainting condition. At midnight the outlook at No. 2 station saw a glare in the south, and thinking that a fire existed among some of the old disused oil buildings in the southeastern portion of the city the company sent in an alarm and started out. They followed Rectory street to the river bank and were soon joined by the city companies. The fire was away across the river in Westminster township, and from their point of vantage the firemen could see the bare brick walls of Thos. Belcher's dwelling house still standing, while the barn and a stable were also destroyed. The house was not used during the winter months, and must have been fired by tramps. About fifteen of these gentry were noticed loitering around the Port Stanley track during the day. The premises were situated on concession B. The damage is estimated to be in the neighborhood of \$2,500. The insurance is unknown. The house was one that had been burglarized early in the winter, and the young men who did the work are now in the Central Prison. There is much complaint of tramps, who hang around outside the city limits and beg, borrow or steal as occasion or necessity demands. The city police keep them out of town, but they have no fear of the county officials. Mr. Belcher is a commercial traveler and is living in South London. The South London brigade made an effort to reach the scene of the fire, but turned back on reaching the city limits on the Wellington road.

Publication of Assessment Rolls. To the Editor of the ADVERTISER: At the instance of No. 1 committee, assisted by Ald. Pritchard, the City Council

on April 2 voted down Ald. Parnell's

motion to publish the assessment roll. For two years past the aldermen have known that the working people generally. as well as small property owners and tenants, have greatly desired the publication of these rolls that the assessment might be equalized. There are many facts affecting the value of a piece of property which it is to the owner's interest to say nothing about, and which the assessors have no opportunity of discovering. The publication of the rolls would prove many assessments to be wretchedly unfair, especially to small property holders. It would show that there are in this city residential properties costing up in the thousands not assessed at over a third of their value, on the ground that their owners are doing good to the city by investing in business and employing labor, while near by there are workingmen's cottages assessed to the full value of the land they stand on, of every board in them and of every hour's labor expended on them. The case of business properties is known to be even worse than this, and the present method of leaving the written rolls in the city offices shuts them off from the inspection of the daily workers as effectually as if they were locked in a bank vault. On the ground that it was prying into private business, Alderman Pritchard claimed it an impertinence to inquire into any man's assessment. It is time the aldermen discovered that nothing is the private business of one man in which others are concerned with him. Every man whose taxes are going with Alderman Pritchard's to make up the expenses of the city is concerned in Alderman Pritchard's assessment exactly in the same way that the alderman's business partner is concerned in the quantity of capital that he may put into or take out of the business; and just as there is nothing fair between business partners but a well-kept set of books open to the in-

there is nothing fair between the citizens of London but full knowledge of the share each is contributing to the city expenses. This is not "private business" at all, it is public business, and the impertinence and stupidity rest all with Alderman Pritchard and No. 1 committee.
