Ottawa, Sept. 9. - The first division in the new House of Commons took place last night at 10:45. It was upon the question as to whether the Government was censurable in having availed itself of the Governor-General's warrants to pay salaries and discharge other current obligations. The Government was sustained in its action by a majority of 34, the vote being: For Foster's amendment, 69; against, 103. Strange to say upon this the first division since the election, and upon a question claimed by the Opposition to be of paramount importance, there were 32 members of the House paired, while six unpaired members failed to vote. The six were Messrs. Angers, Ethier and Fiset, Liberals, and Messrs McGillivray, Pope and Robinson, Conservatives. All but Mr. Ethier were absent. The member for Two Mountains entered the House while the amendment was being read, but not having heard the whole question put was unable to figure in the division. The result, however, was not altered by the failure to record these half dozen votes, as they offset each other. The

prisoned in the Provincial Penitentiary for three years," were the words addressed to James E. Graham, the young man who has fallen into distemptation to abstract money from letters at the London East postoffice,

where he was employed as clerk. Mr. McKillop charged the prisoner under sub-section "D" of the Criminal Code, which reads as follows: "Every one is guilty of an indictable offense and liable to imprisonment for life, or for any term not less than three years, who steals: (a) a post letter bag: or (b) a post letter from a post letter bag or from any postoffice, or ada or from a mail; or (c) a post letter containing any chattel, money or valuable security; or (d) any chattel.
