# Rush to Pekin With No Rest

Order Given to the Forces of the Allies.

A Correspondent's Account of the Recent Fighting-Position of Pekin Legationers Reported as "Desperate"-In Daily Danger of Massacre-Poisoned Flowers Sent to Chinese Minister Yu Keng in Paris.

New York, Aug. 14.-Cabling to the been received at the war department World, Frederick Palmer sends a dispatch dated from the headquarters of yesterday.' the allied troops in the field. Tai Tsung, China, Aug. 8, via Shanghai, Aug. 15, which says: The general advance of the allied troops began this (Wednesday) morning. The order is to rush to Pekin with no rest.

We probably shall arrive at the gates of the Chinese capital in seven days, reaching there next Wednesday.

THE ENEMY IS DEMORALIZED. The Chinese are reported to have retreated straight to Pekin, after having been unexpectedly driven out of Yang Tsun on Monday. Yang Tsun was captured by the Americans under Gen. Chaffee. They led the allies in the forced march from Peitsang and attacked before the natives had recovered from the effects of their signal defeat of the day before.

A BAD BLUNDER. The United States regulars made a dash when they found the enemy and soon were masters of the position. But just there a most distressing thing hapbened. THE PEKIN LEGATIONS. London, Aug. 14, 3:50 a.m.-The British consulate, says the Daily graph's correspondent at Tien Tsin, has received the following message, dated Aug. 6, from Sir Claude Macdonald, British minister in Pekin: "Our situation here is desperate. In ten days our food supply will be at an end. Unless we are relieved a general massacre is probable. The Chinese offer to escort us to Tien Tsin; but remembering Cawnpore, we refuse the offer. There are over two hundred European women and children in this legation.'

NEAR PEKIN. The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express, wiring yesterday, says: "The allies at noon yesterday were

within 20 miles of Pekin. "Gen. Chaffee's report, which is the only authentic news received here regarding the advance, located the international forces about 40 miles from Pekin on Friday. It seems probable that this Shanghal report is optimistic. It is scarcely likely that the allies could advance 20 miles in as many hours.

### THE YANG TSU FIGHT. A Yang Tsu dispatch, dated Aug. 7,

giving details regarding the capture of the place, says: "The Russians and French held the left, the British the left center, the Americans the right center and the Japanese the extreme right. The British and Americans advanced at a rapid rate for 5,000 yards under a severe shell and rifle fire. The Russian and the British-American advance became a race for positions, culminating in a brilliant charge. The heaviest loss of the day was sustained by the Americans, the 14th Infantry having nine killed, 62 wounded and several missing. The Bengal lancers unsuccessfully attempted to cut off the

Chinese retreat." SENT POISONED FLOWERS TO

CHINESE MINISTER. New York, Aug. 13.-A special cable dispatch from Paris to the Evening Telegram today says:

An artful attempt at poisoning by the use of perfumes, which recalls memories of Lucretia Borgia, is exciting all the gossips of Paris.
Thursday, the Chinese minister, Yu Keng, received a letter. It was signed "Julia Czerwinska," and contained some dried flowers, which the writer

asked the minister to accept. The secretary to the legation, Armani di Parma, opened the letter and was immediately overcome deadly odor emanating from the flowers. He fell in a faint. His recovery was accompanied by violent sickness and vomiting. In fact, his condition presented many characteristics of poisoning, and only by prompt treatment was he relieved. Mlle Czerwinska

has been arrested. She appears to be mentally deranged. The flowers are being chemically analyzed.

RUSSIAN BRUTALITY. London, Aug. 13.-The Daily Mail's St. Petersburg correspondent declares that the taking of Aguin has sealed the fate of the rising in Northeastern Manchuria. He adds: "No prisoners were taken by the Russians. Wholesale massacre was the order of the day; and, when the battle was over, the Cossacks rode over the field, killing the wounded with the butt-ends of their muskets."

HALF-WAY TO PEKIN. Washington, Aug. 13.—A dispatch has

AT HO SI WU ON THURSDAY. Washington, D. C., Aug. 13.-The American commander in China, in a dispatch of just three words, received at the war department late this afternoon, sent a thrill of exultation and expectancy throughout official quarters by announcing his arrival at Ho Si Wu, only 33 miles from Pekin, last Thurs-The last heard from him before this was at Yang Tsun, which had been captured after a hard fight. On Thursday he was eighteen miles beyond Yang Tsun. Lang Fang, the place where the ill-fated Seymour expedition met its fate and turned back, had been left behind. The battle of Yang Tsun was fought on the 6th, and the advance on Ho Si Wu was accomplished on the 9th, a march of eighteen miles in three

WITHIN STRIKING DISTANCE. This was four days ago, and at the same rate of progress Chaffee is even now fairly within striking distance of the walls of Pekin. At the rate of progress, six miles a day, made from Yang Tsun to Ho Si Wu, about 24 miles would have been covered in the last four days, and up to today this would leave the international forces nine miles from Pekin. Viewed from any standpint, the advance to Ho Si Wu was of the utmost importance, not only strate-gically, but also in showing that communication was open back to Che Foo, that the expected opposition from Chinese hordes had not been sufficient to prevent the steady forward movement, and in the influence it would exert upon the Chinese government.

Ho Si Wu is a place of considerable size, and the largest town between Tien Tsin and Ching Chia Wan. The latter place and Tung Chow are the two cities of considerable size in the line of advance after leaving Ho Si Wu.

REPLY TO CHINA'S OVERTURES. The reply of the United States government to China's overtures of peace was made public early in the day, showing the firm and final position that had been taken. Exchanges be-tween the various powers have been going on constantly, and the officials have the satisfaction of knowing that of the same date, says: the position of the United States nas the approval and support of all the great power's.
