#### SYNOD OF LONDON AND HAMILTON

Rev. E. W. Panton Elected Moderator at the Meeting in Stratford.

Stratford, April 29.—The Synod of London and Hamilton convened at Knox Church here this evening, with Rev. Gustavus Munroe, D.D., of Ridgetown in the chair, and a very good representation of delegates from the resbyteries of the jurisdiction, which inciuded Sarnia, London, Bruce, Hur-on, Maitland, Stratford, Paris, Chat-ham and Hamilton. Rev. Dr. Munroe preached an eloquent and forceful sermon on retiring from the chair, taking his text from John xvii., 17, 18, 19. The ceremony was a plea for greater consecration of the officers and workers of the church. The synod was afterwards duly constituted, and the election of a moderator for the ensuing year was taken up. There was but one nomination, that of Rev. E. W. Panton, of this city, he being proposed by Rev. M. Radcliffe, of St. Catharines and Rev. Dr. Hamilton, of Motherwell. He was escorted to the chair, and after a brief address of thanks by the newly-appointed moderator a vote of thanks was tendered to the retiring chairman on motion of Rev. Mr. Radcliffe and Rev. Mr. McMullen, of Woodstock. The synod adjourned at

#### DISCUSSED THE ELECTIONS BILL

House in Committee Favors Several Amendments.

Question of Judges' Salaries—Imports From the United States—The Yukon Telegraph Line.

Ottawa, April 29.—The house today considered the elections bill and reported it with amendments providing that the stamp shall be retained and a number placed on the counterfoil to prevent substitutions: the resolutions providing salaries for an increased number of judges in Quebec, and for the chief justice of the supreme court in the Northwest Territories. The greater part of the afternoon was taken up with private bills. The house rose at 11:40 p.m.

Replying to Mr. Charlton it was stated by Mr. Paterson that the imports for consumption from the United States from July 1, 1900, to April 1, 1901, amounted to \$78,702,440, and the dutiable goods amounted to \$37,-

Mr. Tarte, replying to Mr. Ganong, said that the telegraph line from Bennett to Dawson was completed on Sept. 20, and he expected to have the line from Quesnel to Dawson completed by July 1; that up to Dec. 31 last 41,816 messages have been sent over such portions of the line as were finished, and that the revenue amounted to \$107,712: that the average number of messages per month was 2,681, and the monthly revenue was \$7,302 87. The cost of the line so far has been \$430,000, and the total estimated cost is \$460,000. The distances are: From Tagish to Dawson, 518 miles; Tafgish to Atlin, 75 miles, and Atlin to Ashcroft, probably 1,-250 miles.

#### AN AWFUL CHARGE

Coroner's Jury "Suspect" That Charles White, of Brantford, Was Poisoned by His Wife.

Brantford, Ont., 30.—This morning the coroner's jury, which has been holding an inquest upon the body of Charles White, who died suddenly on Sunday, April 14, under circumstances that led to the belief that he had died from poison, brought in a verdict finding that "Charles White died from being poisoned with strychnine, administered, the jury suspected, by the wife of deceased."

Mrs. White was immediately placed under arrest by the police on a charge of murdering her husband, and removed to the county jail, where she spent the night.

#### WAS NEARLY A CENTENARIAN

Death of Mrs. Rebecca Hewitt, Who Lived Under Five British Sovereigns.

Mrs. Rebecca Hewitt died in this city yesterday afternoon, being in her 99th year. She was born in England in 1803, and had thus lived under the third and fourth Georges, William IV., Victoria and Edward VII. She did not leave the old country until she had passed her 70th year, but in the time she lived in London she made many sincere friends. Some nine years ago she suffered a paralytic stroke, but while she could not stand afterwards she regained her faculties in a remarkable degree. Her memory of events that made history early in the last century was remarkably clear. Mrs. Hewitt was the mother of Mrs. F. Keene, of this city, and before her death she saw five generations of her decendants. One son also, Rev. William Hewitt, of North tario, survives her. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon.

Lieut.-Col. Wadmore, of the 3rd R. C. R., at Halifax, accused of contempt of court in connection with the case of Sergt. McPhee, of the same regiment, has been acquitted. The judges found that there was no intention on the part of Wadmore to commit any contempt. They held that any man wearing the King's uniform would be above anything of the kind.
