

South London Youths Punished for Attempting to Extort Money.

Manville Newans, Alfred Cotterel, George Skelly and James Langley, four South London youths, were this morning charged in police court with assaulting Alex. Dowdell, an employe of the McClary Company. Dowdell's evidence was to the effect that on Sunday evening last he was walking with a lady friend on Ridout street south, near Grand avenue, when the four accused youths approached from behind, and one of them suggested that he had, better give them some money. Dowdell says that Langley attacked him, while Cotierel seized hold of the young lady, Langley threatening to shoot Dowdell, and the latter immediately struck Langley, knocking him down, and at the same time called to the lady to run. The four youths then attacked Dowdell, who escaped from them and followed his companion, the young lady, both being pursued by a shower of stones from their attackers. The young lady

corroborated Dowdell's evidence. Three of the prisoners gave evidence in their own defense. Cotterel swore that he and Skelly had left the other two before the trouble started. Newans corroborated them in this, and admitted that it was he himself who had

ported to a strange place and imprisoned within a fence of wire netting t intervals with orders to fire upon any one attempting to escape.
