MEDICAL SCHOOL ADDRESSES TRUST

Faculty Reviews Situation Affecting Hospital.

IMPORTANT PUBLIC QUESTION

Facts of Case Presented in the Hope That Preconceived Notions May Be Set Aside.

The following open letter has been addressed to the Hospital Trust by the Medical School:

Gentlemen,-The faculty of the Medical School begs to address you once more upon the subject of hospital privileges. Our justification for doing so is that it is a public question of very great concern to us and to the city. We cannot conceive of you yourselves attempting a judgment upon it unless the whole tacts are fairly placed before you. That they have not been stated before in their entirety is due to the error that we believed the subject easy of comprehension. It has, however, dawned upon us that men of astute intellect and wide comprehension possibly have not the same facility as we have to secure all the facts upon which to base a judgment. Without further excuse we wish to say that even medical men have not comprehended the full mean-ing of a medical college in this community, and our hope is that in considering a judgment upon the facts of the case, members of the trust will set aside all preconceived notions, and see that it is to the city's best interests to give a most righteous one.

The first step in our line of argument is that the hospital is for the city—not the city for the hospital. One of the functions of a hospital is to house, care for and treat the sick. is equally important that a hospital should instruct and teach; that it should have attached to it a medical college and a training school for nurses. It would be irrational to say that a patient's condition should no teach a medical student, but should teach and train a nurse. Those opposed to medical students entering hospitals, if their opposition be based upon other than mere sentiment, should also be opposed to a training school for nurses being connected with a hospital.

Now, we wish to say, gentlemen, that you, as a trust, have not taken care to fully explain to the public that the medical student, while attending at the hospital (for which he pays), neither treats, operates upon, nor even dresses the wounds of a patient. His relation to the sick is to listen to the instructions, see the operation, and note the mode of dressing. The closest he ever approaches to examining the patient is to listen to abnormal heart and lung sounds in chest disease, and he never gives a prescription nor an order. Furthermore, on all occasions when the patient is too ill to be ectured upon or examined, he is carefully passed by, for the sick are quite as tenderly treated by the Medical School staff as those outside, who seek to prejudice the public against the patient, lonely prisoner that he is, it can be said that the Medical School staff make quite as frequent visits to the sick beds as the outside staff. Further, they are compelled to stay in the wards to examine and investigate the cases for the purpose of teaching six days of the week from half-past one to half-past three. That the examination of the patient is far more useful to him than it could be to the student is a certainty, and it is of the rarest instance to find a patient objecting to this clinical demonstration. On the contrary, it is generally appreciated, as the patient has the satisfaction of having all the pros and cons of his case threshed out in his hearing, except such as would offend his keen sensibilities. No kindness to the sick man can be claimed and treatment of his case. Sauvity of enough in their place, but the kindness to the sick man is to remove his on a sound basis.

From the standpoint of the city, the presence of the school makes it a medical center for Western Ontario. It attracts students from all parts, who afterwards look upon London as their business center, both for themselves and their friends, and also look to the men of the profession of this city as their consultants. The existence of a large medical college here, is a stimulus to the building up of all other lines of education. It attracts men of means, who retire to this city, that they may obtain an education for their sons in arts and medicine. Already many such desirable persons have moved into the city with this in view. The outlook for the future is that within two decades we will have 300 students annually, who, with their friends, will spend from \$300 to \$500 each in the city, and it would be a small calculation indeed to say that five to ten families a year would permanently locate in this city simply on account of its educational advantages, which, gentlemen, we ask you

But this is not the only argument in favor of the city—the Medical Col-lege brings medical education to the very door of the man of limited means, is as ambitious for his children as the rich man could be for his. It places within his reach the power educate his sons at a home school, so that in this respect the Medical College is especially the poor man's friend. He, with the wealthy parent, would prefer (were the medical advantages anything near those of a foreign city) to have their boys beneath the parental roof during their college days for

Twenty years ago the city council pledged the public wards of the hospital for the winter months, to the staff of the Medical School. Since that pledge was given the various boards of hospital trustees have indorsed and continued the arrangement. They were composed of men of sound judgment, and nobility of purpose. The Medical School expected a continuity of govern-ment—expected that privileges made and carried out for twenty years would not be set aside suddenly and lightly. and finally, gentlemen, the change that you have made has not a single advantage to the hospital, while it is a cruel and crippling thrust to the Medical School, which we hope you will at the earliest possible moment seek to remove, inasmuch as the Medical School is a worthy institution that should be helped and not hindered.
