DEATH OF MRS. WHEELER.

Toronto Globe: The death of Mrs. George Wheeler, which occurred at her late residence on Crawford street, on Sunday, is deeply regretted by a large circle of friends and acquaintances. She was the only daughter of the late Wm. Hamilton, J. P., one of the pioneer residents and prominent citizens of Uxbridge, and the wife of George

Wheeler, formerly member of the House of Commons for West Ontario, who died in 1881. Mrs. Wheeler was a devoted mother and a most capable and efficient business woman. She was well known in her place, but the kindness to the sick man is to remove his diseased condition, and place his body on a sound basis.

It will be assented to that clinical teaching is a compulsory stimulus to this act—in fact, the astute student will have his keen questions not infrequently pointed away to a solution of the difficulties of the case, and among 40 or 50 students there are many splendid specimens of manliness, who exhibit wonderful touches of sympathy, bristling with words of cheer and hope to the patient. There are among patients in our hospitals many who find in the medical profession a source of broken by the cheerful visits of the clinical clerks, or students, accompanying the teaching staff. And here we wish to say that the staff can give the fullest advantage to the patients in the public wards, without the employment of clinical clerks, and clinical teaching is not a necessary adjunct to the medical school.

Such are the advantages that are obtained for the patient himself.

The outlook for the future is that within two decades we will have 300 students annually, who, with their friends, will spend from \$300 to \$500 each in the city, and it would be a small calculation indeed to say that five to ten families a year would permanently locate in this city simply on account of the educational advantages which, gentlemen, we ask you to foster.

But this is not the only argument in favor of the Medical College. The very brain of the man of limited means, who is as ambitious for his children as the rich man could be for his. It places within his reach the power to educate his sons at a home school, so that in this respect the Medical College is especially the poor man's friend.

With a healthy parent, would not an incentive in this to medical progress in this community they would guard it quite as jealously as they would their public schools? The doctor who does not receive a stimulus from this school, whether connected with it or not, falls short of the influences of his surroundings and privileges.

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MEDICAL SCHOOL ADDRESSES TRUST

Faculty Reviews Situation Affecting Hospital.

IMPORTANT PUBLIC QUESTION

Facts of Case Presented in the Hope That Preconceived Notions May Be Set Aside.

The following open letter has been addressed to the Hospital Trust by the Medical School:

Gentlemen,—The faculty of the Medical School begs to address you once more upon the subject of hospital privileges. Our justification for doing so is that the public question of very great concern to us and to the city. We cannot conceive of you yourselves attempting a judgment upon it unless the whole fact has been placed before you. But they have not been stated before in their entirety is due to the error that we believed the subject easy of comprehension. It has, however, dawned upon us that men of astute intellect and wide comprehension possibly have not the same facility as we have to secure all the facts upon which to base a judgment. Without further excuse we wish to say that even medical men have not comprehended the full meaning of a medical college in this community, and our hope is that in considering a judgment upon the facts of the case, members of the trust will set aside
