DEATH OF MRS. CONVERSE**She Was the Only Female Indian Chief in America.**

New York, Nov. 20.—Mrs. Harriet Maxwell Converse, known to the Indians as the "Chief of the Six Indian Nations," died in her home here Tuesday night of apoplexy. Mrs. Converse was known to the tribes of Seneca, Onondaga, Cayuga, Oneida, Mohawk and Oneida, as "Priestess," "Mother," and "Chief." She was the only woman, it is said, to receive the "Sage Totem," and she was the highest in rank that is known to any of the tribes. Mrs. Converse was "adopted" by the tribes of the Seneca, and in their eyes became an Indian. General Parker, a full-blooded Indian chief on Gen. Grant's staff, who died ten years ago, was the cause primarily of Mrs. Converse being made chief of the tribes, having expressed a dying wish to that effect.
