**TRANSPORT CASTIAN** REACHES CAPE TOWN

With C. M. R. on Board All Well—Two Cavalry Camps for Ontario.

Ottawa, June 2.—Two cavalry camps are authorized for Ontario, one to be held at Kingston and the other at Niagara. The corps of Toronto and Western Ontario will drill at Niagara.

The transport Castian, with the Canadian Mounted Rifles on board, has arrived at Cape Town. A message has been received that all are well on board.

**INSPECTING THE NIAGARA TUN-**NEL.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., June 3.—The inspection of the mammoth tunnel of the Niagara Falls Power Company was successfully accomplished Sunday, and the tunnel was found to be in perfect condition. The tunnel is 21 feet high and 18 feet 10 inches wide, and it carries off 4,600 cubic feet of water every second, and when the new wheel pit is running it will carry off 9,000 cubic feet per second. The trip through the tunnel, a mile and a third through the heart of the city, and 200 feet below the surface, was made by a party of officials of the power company and Clemens Herschel, the hydraulic engineer.

## TEXT OF TERMS ON WHICH THE CONFLICT IN SOUTH AFRICA HAS BEEN TERMINATED

As Announced by Hon. A. J. Balfour Before an Enthusiastic Audience in the British House.

### A Great Gathering of Peers in the Gallery.

### SCENE LONG TO BE REMEMBERED

Glance in Which the Boers Acknowledge King Edward as Sovereign Was the Hit of the Day.

London, June 2.—In the House of Commons to-day, the First Lord of the Treasury and Government leader, A. J. Balfour, announced the terms of peace in South Africa, as follows:

"His Excellency Lord Milner, in behalf of the British Government; his Excellency Mr. Steyn, General Brenner, General C. R. Dewet, and Judge Hertzog, acting in behalf of the Orange Free State, and General Schalkburg, General Reitz, General Louis Botha and General De laere, acting in behalf of their respective burghers, desiring to terminate the present hostilities, agree to the following Terms.

"First—The burgher forces in the field will forthwith lay down their arms and hand over all their guns, rifles and ammunition of war in their possession or under their control, and desist from further resistance, and acknowledge King Edward VII. as their lawful sovereign. The manner and details of this surrender will be arranged between Lord Kitchener and Commandant-General Botha, assisted by General De laere and Chief Commandant Dewet.

"Second—All burghers outside the limits of the Transvaal and Orange River Colony, and all prisoners of war at present outside South Africa, who are burghers, will, on duly declaring their acceptance of the position of subjects of his majesty, be brought back to their homes as soon as means of transport can be provided and means of subsistence assured.

"Third—The burghers on returning will not be deprived of their personal liberty or property.

"Fourth—No proceeding, civil or criminal, will be taken against any burghers surrendering, or so returning, for any act in connection with the prosecution of the war. The benefits of this clause do not extend to certain acts contrary to the usages of war, which had been notified by the commander-in-chief to the Boer generals, and which shall be tried by court-martial after the close of hostilities.

"Fifth—The Dutch language will be taught in the public schools of the colony, and the acknowledging them where the parents desire it, and will be allowed in the courts of law, for the better and more effectual administration of justice.

"Sixth—Possession of rifles will be allowed in the Transvaal and Orange River Colony to persons requiring them for their protection, on taking out a license, according to law.

"Seventh—The military administration of the Transvaal and Orange River Colony will, at the earliest possible date, be succeeded by a civil government, and so soon as circumstances permit, representative institutions, leading up to self-government will be introduced.

"Eighth—The question of granting the franchise to natives will not be decided until after the introduction of self-government.

"Ninth—No special tax will be imposed on the property in the Transvaal or Orange River Colony to defray the expenses of the war.

"Tenth—So soon as the condition permitted, the commission, which the local inhabitants will be represented, will be appointed in each district of the Transvaal and Orange River Colony, under the presidency of a magistrate or other official, for the purpose of assisting in the restoration of the people to their homes, and supplying them who, owing to war losses, are unable to provide for themselves with food and shelter, and the necessary amount of seed, stock and implements, indispensable to the resumption of their normal occupations. His Majesty's Government will place at the disposal of these commissions the sum of three million pounds sterling (\$15,000,000), and will allow all the not less than the law of 1900 of the South African Republic, and all receipts given up to the officers in the field of the late republic, or under the orders to be presented to a judicial commission, which will be appointed by the government, and if such notes and receipts are found by this commission to have been duly issued in return for valuable considerations they will be received by the first named commissions as evidence of war losses suffered by the persons to which they were originally given.

"In addition to the above-named grant of three million pounds sterling, his majesty's government will be prepared to make advances, on loan, for the same purposes, free of interest for two years, and afterwards repayable over a period of years, with 3 per cent interest. No foreigner or rebel will be entitled to benefit under this clause.

After he had concluded reading the peace agreement, Mr. Balfour proceeded:

There are certain important points not dealt with in the document I have just read, and which was signed on Saturday night. Therefore, it may be convenient, if I read a dispatch from Lord Kitchener to the secretary of state for war, dated May 30, as follows:

"After handing the Boer delegates a copy of the draft of the agreement, I read them a statement and gave them a copy of it, as follows:

"His majesty's government must place before the Boer delegates the terms of the Cape and Natal colonies who have been in rebellion, and who now surrender at will, if they return to their colonies, and be granted to certain subjects in Cape Colony, now in the field, or who have surrendered or been captured since April 12, 1901, are as follows: With regard to the rank and file, they should all, after surrender and giving up their arms, sign a document, before the resident magistrate of the district in which they are, acknowledging their guilt, and the punishment to be accorded them, provided they are not guilty of murder or acts contrary to the usages of civilized warfare, shall be that they are not entitled for life to be registered as voters, or vote in any parliamentary or provincial council or municipal election. The peace, field cornets and all others who held official positions under the Government of Cape Colony, or who have been occupying a position of authority, or who have held command in the rebel or burgher forces, they shall be tried for high treason before the ordinary courts of the country, or such special courts as may hereafter be constituted, their punishment to be left to the discretion of such court, with the proviso that in no case shall the penalty of death be inflicted. The

**CONGRATULATIONS TO THE KING.**

London, June 3.—King Edward has been the recipient of a very great number of congratulatory telegrams from European sovereigns and princes. A message from Emperor William is understood to have been of a particularly gratifying character. A message from the pope conveys the pontiff's sincere congratulations on the re-establishment of peace in South Africa.

**THE KING'S NARROW ESCAPE.**

King Edward narrowly escaped what might have been a serious accident yesterday morning. His majesty was driving to St. James' Palace, when a cab collided with his carriage, the cab horse fell and lay struggling under the royal carriage. The King alighted and stepped upon the pavement until matters were righted.

**THE MURDERER RICE** TO BE HANGED JULY 18

Convicted Bank Robber and Murderer of Constable Boyd Sentenced.

Toronto, Ont., June 3.—The first death sentence pronounced upon a prisoner in the new court house was passed yesterday by Chief Justice Falconbridge on Fred Lee Rice, the convicted bank robber and murderer of Constable Boyd, who was shot a year ago while Rice, Jones and Rutledge sought to escape from a cab in which they were being taken to jail.

The judge sentenced Rice to be hanged on July 18.

A MEMORABLE SCENE. Not in years had the House of Commons been so thronged with a brilliant and enthusiastic audience as when the first lord of the treasury, Hon. A. J. Balfour, announced the peace terms concluded with the Boers. Long before the customary prayer the galleries of the house were packed.

Joseph H. Choate, the United States ambassador; Henry White, the secretary of the embassy; Lord Rothschild, and many members of the cabinet patiently waited through the answering of questions in the house for the momentous announcement.

An unusually large number of peers sat in their gallery, and behind the ladies' grill aristocratic women were packed. Noticeable among them was Lady Sarah Wilson, who thus saw the end of the drama in which she played such an active part.

Mr. Chamberlain and Mr. Balfour both received a great ovation as they walked to their seats. The period of waiting finally came to an end, when, amid breathless silence, broken a few seconds later by applause such as the House of Commons seldom hears, Mr. Balfour stood up and announced the terms on which the war in South Africa had been ended.

being greeted with a salvo of "Hearts," and applause from the galleries, the occupants of which refused to be silenced. As the liberality of the terms grew louder the cheers and the same of the house diminished, while the opposition's satisfaction was proportionately increased.
