JAP COMPANY WAS ANNIHILATED

Says Russian Official Account of Battle of July 3 at Lang Tse Pass.

St. Petersburg, July 5.—The general staff has received the following dispatch from General Sakuroff, the chief of staff of Gen. Kuropatkin, dated July 4: "On July 3 the advance guard of the Russian force, operating east of Lang Yang, occupied a position at Lang Tse Pass. Towards the same detachment of the enemy's advance guard, 1,500 strong, had occupied the villages of Elkhavuan and Tcha Kuen Sea, on our front, the main force having remained in Pen Shui and Mo Tien Passes. At this moment we discovered the movement of a Japanese detachment, consisting of a battalion of infantry, to turn left flank positions in the Lang Tse Pass, in the direction of the roads leading to Sin Kiu and the strength of the enemy's position in front of Lang Tse Pass. The commander of the detachment ordered it was reinforced, and a reconnoitering party of ten companies was sent in the direction of Elkhavuan under the command of our Lieut. Colonel. With the view of making a demonstration insuring the return of Letchitzky's detachment, companies, under Lieut. Col. Garnitsky, marched to Ma-houmizsa, about a mile and a half south of Elkhavuan, to the crossing of the roads leading to Sin Kiu and the Lok River Passes. Firing began at 2:30 p.m. on July 4. Garnitsky's column reached the crossing, and annihilated a company of the enemy's advance guard, which was almost annihilated. Simultaneously Letchitzky's column dislodged the Japanese from their entrenchments and occupied the pass. As the enemy was preparing to deliver a frontal attack, Garnitsky's column then retired, as previously instructed. Three companies of Garnitsky's force, however, remained, which they had been ordered to secure.

When Letchitzky's force began withdrawal, the enemy opened a heavy fire from the heights. In spite of this the column retired in perfect order. Brave Letchitzky, who had been continuously on the fighting line, and directed the column with remarkable ability and coolness. Garnitsky's column behaved with extraordinary bravery and coolness, carrying out their task with no sign of agitation.

Our casualties were: Letchitzky, bruised and wounded; Col. Popelov, Lieut. Col. Trakhenovsky, Captain Soloff, Lieut. Latkine, Bobroslavsky, and Kozine, Second Captain Paly and several other officers wounded, and two hundred soldiers killed or wounded.

"I observed the fighting with my staff from the Tichacuan tower, and I can personally testify to the conduct of the troops. I cannot pass in silence the remarkable devotion of the surgeons and of the chaplain who attended the wounded. He braved the fire, and even helped to carry them off the field. All the wounded were removed.

"On the morning of July 5 our reinforcements occupied Lian Dian Shan. One soldier was killed during the fighting. The afternoon saw a detachment of the enemy, consisting of two battalions and six squadrons, with six machine guns, and having attacked our outposts, lying south of the valley of the River Kho, who retreated under the vigorous fire of the enemy. The officer commanding our advance cavalry advanced at 2:30 p.m. with a detachment, and at the same time the enemy's detachment, guns on the height northwest of Doun Schkedja, and their infantry occupied the outskirts of the forest near the village. Our horse battery retreated on the position of Daoshticha, near the railway, being covered by mounted and dragons. The enemy quickly evacuated their position towards the village of Chen. Our cavalry pursued them until they reached an entrenched position occupied by a strong force of the enemy.

"The enemy's principal forces are at present concentrated at Vandiapudze, in the direction of the village of Schi Kouyo, about ten miles west of Shi Yen, on the road to Kai Chou. Reconnoissances on July 3, discovered that the enemy is fortifying in Tai Pass."

A House Boat Tragedy.

Lawrenceburg, Ind., July 5.—James Wilson's house boat, moored a mile below town, on the Ohio River, was blown up with dynamite early yesterday. Wilson's wife and infant child are believed to have been killed in the ruins. Wilson has been drinking for several days, and it is known that he and his wife have been quarreling. He has disappeared.

Foyer Released.

Denver, Colorado, July 6.—Charles H. Moyer, president of the Western Federation of Miners, was released from custody by Sheriff Bell, of Teller County, in this city, yesterday afternoon, after furnishing bonds of \$10,000 on the charges of murder and inciting riot, filed against him at Cripple Creek. Bonds were provided by a guarantee company. Moyer has been a prisoner 103 days, and during the greater portion of that time was confined in the Teller County Jail, on the plea of "military necessity."
