RADIUM AS MIND CURE
Experiments Good Results in Insanity Cases.

New York, Sept. 23.—A new remedy for insanity, from which English scientists expect much, has been brought here by Dr. S. G. Tracy, of this city, who has been active in the investigation of the wonderful new power which promises to revolutionize the science of medicine.

Dr. Tracy returned from London, where he has spent a month in hospitals, studying the application of radium in medicine. There experiments were made with demented patients, according to Dr. Tracy, and remarkable results were obtained.

"The manner of application," said Dr. Tracy, "is by means of a sort of cap closely fitted to the patient's head. This is charged with radium and barium of 50,000 activity. This radio-activity has produced really remarkable results in cases not only of insanity, but of locomotor ataxia, though, of course, further experimentation will be necessary before the usefulness of the new remedy is established.

"Perhaps quite as interesting is the new method of applying radium for the cure of cancer and cancerous growths. This method was suggested by Sir William Ramsay, the distinguished English scientist. His great cost puts it out of the reach of the mass of patients, which is its chief drawback.

"The method consists of dissolving radium in water and from the emanations of this forming a second solution. This second solution is injected into the patient with a hypodermic needle.

"The amount of radium dissolved is 100 milligrams, and this costs \$2,500, but after the powder has been dissolved it can be precipitated and again dissolved, and this repeated for an indefinite number of times.

"Six cases are under experimentation in London, and it is reported that the results are successful. They have not yet been under scientific scrutiny long enough thoroughly to prove the cure, however.

"Here is another cure, also new, continued Dr. Tracy, driving a small disc of lead-covered metal from a case. "This is bismuth impregnated with radium and is applied externally. This cure comes from Germany.

DOES NOT WANT WEST OVERLOOKED

Rev. R. E. Welsh Asks for a Wide Distribution of Bibles There.

Rev. R. E. Welsh, M. A., the newly-appointed secretary of the Canadian Bible Society, preached a very scholarly and interesting sermon in the First Methodist Church yesterday morning. Mr. Welsh is a ready and fluent talker, with a good literary style. He is a decided advocate of the pulpit forces of this country. He was in Numbers, 23, and told the tale of the Israelites' marching with the Ark of the Lord before them. He said the Ark as his subject he drew an analogy between the Ark and the Bible. The latter being the ark of the covenant, the Ark represented the equivalent of it. The Ark represented the presence of God with his people. Law must be at the basis of life. But greater than law was mercy. The greatest of all was when God reached out salvation through the sacrifice of Christ. The Bible contained the mind of God. The will of God. It contained the history of the incarnated word of God. So men can know absolutely what God thinks and feels. It embodies the divine ideas and ideals.

Mr. Welsh made a plea for a wider distribution of the Word of God. He gave a short history of the work of the British and Foreign Bible Society, in which he declared that it was the testimony of missionaries that without the Bible, the corners of the earth and the inaccessible places of the world would be practically unfruitful. Their collectors had gone to the most remote corners of the earth and had spread the truth of God. He also made a plea for more Bibles for the Canadian Northwest. The most touching sight of his life was when he was in Winnipeg, and saw the motley thousands in the dishevelled and ragged condition of the west. A nation was being born. What is to be done? Give them the Bible in their own language. They were now in the plastic state and could be moulded aright.

Rev. Mr. Welsh preached in St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in the evening to a large audience.

A WELL-KNOWN RESIDENT DEAD

Mr. John Overell Had Spent Half a Century in London.

By the death on Saturday afternoon of Mr. John Overell, London lost one of her oldest and most respected citizens.

Mr. Overell, who was in his 74th year, was a native of England, but he had spent the greater part of his life in Canada. He was educated in Quebec, where he remained until he was 18 years of age, going from there to California at the time of the gold fever. He returned to Quebec two years later, subsequently coming to London in 1854. For 51 years he had been a continuous resident of the city.

Mr. Overell followed the business of an accountant and was for many years one of the leading financial concerns of the city. He was for some years secretary of the London Mutual Fire Insurance Company.

Mr. Overell was particularly prominent in Masonic matters. He was a past master and a life member of the winning Lodge, No. 64, and had been for 25 years its efficient secretary. He was also a past grand officer of grand lodge, and a past first principal of St. George's Royal Arch Chapter, No. 5. For some years he was identified with the Lodge of Perfection of the Scottish Rite, and withdrew from that body about 10 years since. He was one of the oldest members of the Brunswick Club and had for many years officiated as its secretary.

The deceased had been ill less than a week from kidney trouble. Memorial Church. He is survived by his wife, who was formerly Miss Clarke, of Paris. The funeral will be held this afternoon from the family residence, 437 Malind street.

The rector's inaugural message to his congregation emphasized some of the duties dependent upon the minister and his charge. He compared the action of a minister to those of a sentinel, whose duty is to stand guard against the eye of the enemy. If a minister is going to be a faithful minister, his first duty is to set a watch over himself, a preacher, like other men, is subjected to the same passions, and many of the same temptations, and is not as exempt from having to resist temptation. The speaker would in all things set a watch over his every action. He expressed the importance of prayer in public life. He emphasized its absolutely essential nature to the success of any man or woman. In speaking of the modern rush and activity in business circles, he said that prayer was tabooed among many people's lives, because they had no time for it. It is the duty of the minister and his people to watch against the bustle, which so tends towards the failure of every man that lives his life apart from God. Mr. Lowe spoke of the duties the congregation owed each other. It was an impossibility to live their lives alone. A man could no live alone, neither could he die alone. Duties devolved among the congregation that the minister would not be able to attend to.

Very often individuals of the congregation became offended at remarks of a general nature, passed by the minister, which they took in a personal way. It was a minister's duty to warn his people, and a very important duty it was.

"I promise you while I am your rector I shall never preach what is called a personal sermon. I'll preach, mayhap, sermons of warning, but always of a general nature. The man who preaches to an individual who, in an audience, is unable to answer back, is a coward. The filling of the church was dependent as much on the people as on the rector. In this respect, everyone's assistance was needed. He spoke briefly on several minor matters, all of which were essential to the smooth running of the church's affairs. In closing he said:

"Let us understand each other's expectations. I pray and I trust that we shall work together in unity. I pray God's richest blessing will rest on you in your homes. I beseech your prayers for the responsibilities of a minister are great."

A solo was rendered at the close of the service by Mrs. Zwicker.
