Hunt Foxes With Engles.

A Siberian correspondent of the Sphere sends some photographs relating to a form of fox hunting which is probably unique. The hunting of foxes with eagles take place among the Kirghese, in the southwest district of Siberia, known as the general government of the steppes. It is a foverity sport with the Kirghese.
