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# AT COMPANY'S SUGGESTION

Manager King Wanted the City to Agree to Fix the Population at 50,000 in Order to Get 1,200 Feet of Additional Track---City Fathers Said No and Then the Company Proposed Sending Matter to the Commission.

That decision was arrived at today at noon, when a conference between No. 1 committee and the London Street Railway Company was held. There was not much debate on the question, especially when the company, through their manager, stated what they wanted for the extension.

Mr. King declared that this extension was to apply until the city reached a population of 50,000. To convey what this means it will be necessary to explain that when the agreement between the city and company was made, the population was

The North End extension will be adjudicated upon by the Ontario

fixed at 39,000, and for every 2,000 population thereafter the city was entitled to a mile of track. When the Ridout street line was built, the population was named at 43,000. Thus, if the population of the city was fixed at 50,000, by a census, the people would be entitled to three miles more of track.

Washington Fears Treaty May Shriners Had the Great Home Soon Be Abrogated.

ONE REQUEST REFUSED

State Department Declines to Send New Boat for the Toledo Reserves.

Valter Brown and Captain Hicklett to secure a boat for the Toledo naval reserves to replace the ancient Essex has called attention to the treaty behibiting war vessels on the great lakes. Some of the officials around the

state department are of the opinion that this country has gone too far already in furnishing vessels enough minutes. for the naval reserves on the great lakes, and that the training ships on these waters should be removed. It is being suggested that Canada,

in issuing permits for the large fleet of naval training ships, is now in position to make similar requests from the United States for such vessels, and that if a halt is not called this treaty will be virtually abro-

ators from Illinois, the state departgunboat Nashville on the great lakes as a training ship for the Illinois naval reserve. The Nashville carries a full armament and she has no right on the lakes under the treaty. Naturally, Toledo, which has a strong organization of reserves, is asking for the same class of boat, and the state department is convinced that if a halt is not called there will soon be a strong fleet on the lakes.
