Many Dog Cases Before Police Magistrate Love This Morning.

At this morning's session of the police court, three persons were each fined \$2 for allowing their dogs to be at large without a muzzle. Another man, charged with allowing his dog out without a proper muzzle, was reprimanded by Mr. E. C. Scatterd, who produced a leather muzzle, which the dog, a spaniel puppy, had been wearing.
"My client asked Blackstock if that muzzle would do for the pup," said Mr. Scatterd.

A citizen charged with allowing his dog out without a muzzle, was not present, but the evidence was taken and the case adjourned until Saturday. A similar charge against a lady, was also adjourned.

TURNKEY STICKLES DIES AFTER A LONG ILLNESS

Well-Known Official of the County Jail Passed Away This Morning.

Deceased was a member of St. Paul's Cathedral and the funeral, which will be held on Saturday afternoon to Woodland Cemetery, will be conducted by Canon Dann.

LONDON BOY SAID TO BE ON RAMPAGE

Walter Orchard Appeared in Windsor Police Court on Wednesday.

The Detroit News says: Walter Orchard, aged 18, who says his home is in London, Ont., appeared in the police court, Windsor, Wednesday morning charged with drunkenness, to which he pleaded guilty. He was fined \$5 or 15 days in jail. Orchard was arrested by Officer James Jones Tuesday afternoon while engaged in a lively dispute in a Windsor hardware store, where he had gone to purchase a revolver. Orchard told the clerk he was going to shoot two of his companions who had robbed him of some money. The clerk called the police station and while Orchard was arguing and threatening, Jones took him into custody.

FROHMAN'S LATEST

Typewriter Girl's Play Enthusiastically Received by London Audience.

London, May 19.—A meagre audience assembled to witness the production of Elizabeth Baker's play, "Chains." The author, who is a typewriter, attended the rehearsals during her lunch hour, the only leisure she had. What the audience lacked in numbers it made up in enthusiasm.
"Chains" was first produced last year by the Playgoers at a Sunday night performance. It is the story of a city clerk who is seized with a desire to go out into the world and to get away from the routine of life. His wife, family and friends, however, urge him not to go. He succumbs and settles down to daily drudgery.
Types of the lower middle class are faithfully represented. The audience demanded the authoress until she was forced to appear, and a laudable, shrinking, frightened figure was led on to the stage by two of the actors. Although this is her first play it is a notable work. It is well constructed, with Ibsenian touches.

It has been announced from Ottawa that Capt. R. Burritt, of the Twenty-eighth Perth Regiment, Stratford, is transferred to the Winnipeg Grenadiers. The many friends of Capt. Burritt will be pleased to learn of his promotion.

A large crowd turned out at the city hall last night to hear Miss Ames Knox-Black, Miss Black entertained those present with scenes from "Macbeth," and her high elocutionary powers, with the dramatic manner of presentation, made an impression upon the people of Stratford that will long be remembered.

COL. WATTERSON TO NEWSPAPERMEN

Great American Editor Addresses Canadian Press Association.

Toronto, May 19.—Col. Henry Waterson, of the Louisville Courier-Journal, discussed a few of the points of strength and weakness in journalism as it exists today in an address which he delivered before the Canadian Press Association yesterday afternoon.
In many quarters it has been the practice to decry present day methods and to hark back, for appreciative contrasts, to an era that is gone.
While unwilling to give the stamp of his approval to all the later developments of modern journalism, Col. Waterson is disposed to hold the scale of justice fairly even between the present and the past.
In the old days of personal journalism the stamp of authority and individuality was given to more of the output of the press, but on the other hand there was the danger of the writer using his paper for the achievement of purely personal ends.
Col. Waterson was inclined to think that the newspapers of the future would be directed more and more from the business office—a development which he was not prepared to wholly deplore.
Someone in the audience was anxious to know whether they were to understand that the last had been seen of the great editors and that in the future there would only be great business managers.
"Not exactly that," replied the colonel. "The forcible writer will always impress his personality on the newspaper with which he is associated. A 'Quarterly Bulletin' has also been the last of the self-exploiting journalists—the men who used their papers not so much to bring about reforms as to keep themselves in the public eye. When the change I have mentioned has been fully achieved—when the counting house, as is largely the case today, has become supreme—the business manager will be a trained journalist."
