Any less time than sixty days, they said, would interfere with the proper investigation of the losses and would facilitate the collection of dishonest and exorbitant claims.

Col. Clark expressed the opinion that when the committee adjourned while the House was in session, that the general opinion was that fifteen days was sufficient time in which to allow insurance companies to meet all claims. On the suggestion of the Hon. Mr. Foy, however, the committee made the regulation mentioned.

Mr. W. G. Wright strenuously objected to the practice among some insurance companies of demanding a discount for prompt settlement. He instanced one case where a discount of \$560 was demanded by a company for prompt settlement of insurance of \$15,000. This was the general practice, he declared, but other insurance companies were very careful in writing fire insurance. Solothurn Canton, who has just been sentenced to four and a half years' imprisonment for thefts, has behind him one of the most remarkable records for adroit swindling that has ever come before a Russian court. Variety has not been lacking, and the tale of his past life, as unfolded by the police, reads more like part of a sensational novel than real life.
